CONVENT AND ACADEMY OF THE IMMACULATE CONCEPTION, Opelousas, Louisiana.
THIS institution will be opened by the Ladies of the "Holy Cross" in the beginning of October, in the Town of Opelousas, for the education of the young Ladies of the Parish and of the neighboring Parishes. The location is most delightful, and offers all the extra advantages which parents may desire for their children. The system of education will embrace all the branches taught in the best Institutions of America or Europe: Reading, Spelling, Grammar, Composition, Rhetoric, Elocution, applied to the French and English languages, to both of which the utmost attention will be paid, and both of which the pupils will most carefully be trained to speak and write with correctness, elegance and fluency.—Writing, Geography, sacred and profane, ancient and modern History, Mythology, Arithmetic, Book-keeping, the elements of Algebra and Geometry, Natural Philosophy, Natural History, Domestic Economy, Sewing, Embroidery, Artistic Designs, Drawing, Painting, Vocal and Instrumental Music.—This last branch will be taught by a distinguished Artist just arrived from New-Orleans.
Nothing will be omitted to kindle in the pupils a vivid emulation for learning; the greatest attention will also be paid to develop their talents, form their hearts, and elevate their character. They will have nothing to fear from evil examples or evil associations, remaining at all times within the enclosure of the convent, and under the eyes of kind benefactors, who will watch over their morals with maternal affection. They will receive no visits, except from their parents or relations, who will be admitted to see them in the parlors, on the Sabbath days, or on certain days on Sundays after the high mass.
The utmost attention will be paid to the health of the pupils, the diet will be wholesome and abundant, the sick will be nursed with maternal vigilance and tenderness.
Religion is the ground work of education. The Institution is Catholic; however, young ladies who may belong to other denominations will be received, on the only condition conforming to the public exercises of the hospital.

To enable parents to send their children at an earlier age to school—a child may profit from the age of seven or eight, and even younger,—to keep them longer, and send several of them at once, the most moderate prices have been adopted.—For Board and Tuition, \$100 per scholastic year of ten months, payable quarterly in advance; Day-scholars will pay \$20, \$30 or \$40, for the scholastic year, according to their talents and the class to which they are admitted. Music on the Piano or the Guitar will be charged \$5 per month, \$1 per month for the use of the Piano—\$3, per month for vocal music.
Parents will have to supply their children with books and paper, and provide for the washing of their clothes; expenses incurred in sickness will also be charged to them.
Boarders will have to be supplied, at their expense, with necessaries, but a sufficient quantity of sheets, blankets, towels, and bed linen, will be provided; they must also bring the uniform, consisting for the whole year in a blue dress, with cape of the same color, trimmed with black velvet; two sun bonnets, 1 blue, 1 brown lining; two pairs of stockings, 2 white, 2 blue; a spoon, fork, tumbler and knife; also a small bucket, brushes, comb, a pitcher, bowl and looking-glass.—These three last articles will be provided for them, to preserve uniformity in the dressing room.
