FOR THE EDUCATION OF YOUNG MEN.
UNDER THE DIRECTION OF
DR. J. A. DELARUE, PRINCIPAL; Professor of French and Latin.
N. MOSS, Professor of English and English Literature.

BEING a resident of this locality, for the last four years, having assisted Mrs. Delarue in the direction of her school for Young Ladies, founded in the year 1814, and which terminated only at the death of its founder, I expect to be able fully to answer the expectations of those parents who shall have confided the education of their children to me. A religious motto should then be "Adoration, love of God and our neighbor." Every student will be bestowed upon the students.—Their food will be healthy and abundant. They shall have for their recreation and the exercise necessary to their health, large and spacious playgrounds. In fine, every thing will be done for the physical and moral improvement of the students.

The system of education will embrace all the branches taught in the best Institutions of America or Europe. Teaching Spelling, Grammar, Composition, Rhetoric, Eloquence, applied to the French and English languages, to both of which the utmost attention will be paid, and both of which the pupils will most carefully be taught to speak and write with correctness, elegance and fluency.—Writing, Geography, sacred and profane, ancient and modern History, Mythology, Arithmetic, Book-Keeping, the elements of Algebra and Geometry, Natural Philosophy, Mental History, Domestic Economy, Sewing, Embroidery, Artificial Flowers, Drawing, Painting, Vocal and Instrumental Music.—This last branch will be taught by a distinguished Artist just arrived from New-Orleans.
Nothing will be omitted to kindle in the pupils a vivid emulation for learning; the greatest attention will also be paid to develop their minds, form their hearts and elevate their character. They will have the privilege of reading, except on the market days, remaining at all times within the enclosure of the house, and under the eyes of kind teachers, who will watch over their morals with paternal affection. They will receive no visits, except from their parents or relatives, who will be admitted to see them in the parlor, on Thursdays after the morning classes and on Sundays after the high mass.
The utmost attention will be paid to the health of the pupils; the diet will be wholesome and abundant, the sick will be nursed with maternal vigilance and tenderness.
Religion is the ground work of education. The Institution is Catholic; those who are converts who may belong to other denominations will be received, on the only condition of conforming to the public exercises of the house.
To enable parents to send their children at an earlier age to school, a child may profit from the age of seven or eight, and even sooner,—to keep them longer, and send several of them at once, the most moderate prices have been adopted.—For Board and Tuition, \$100 per month, or \$1000 per year, in monthly payments, or quarterly in advance. Day-scholars will pay \$20, \$30 or \$40, for the scholastic year, according to their age and the classes they will attend. Music on the Piano or the Organ will be charged \$5 per month, \$1 per month for the use of the Piano, \$3 per month for vocal music, in advance.
Parents will have to supply their children with books and papers, and provide for the washing of their clothes; expenses incurred in sickness will also be charged to them.
Boarders will have to be supplied, at their entrance, with a sufficient quantity of clothing; they must also bring the uniform, consisting for the whole year in a blue dress, with cape of the same color, trimmed with black velvet; two pairs of stockings, blue, 1 of brown linen; two pairs, 1 blue, 1 white, 2 yds. a spoon, fork, tumbler, and knife; also a small bucket, brushes, combs, a pitcher, bowl, and looking-glass.
