Opelousas, February 26, 1862.  
GENERAL ORDERS No. 2.  
I. In compliance with special orders No. 11, issued from General Headquarters, February 23, 1862, I call upon the Regiment of this Brigade to furnish volunteers for State service in accordance with the order annexed.  
II. This requisition, as rapidly as furnished, will rendezvous at the old College buildings in the town of Opelousas, where quarters will be prepared for the reception of the troops.  
III. The Colonels of the several Regiments composing this Brigade are charged with the execution of this order, and they will immediately, each within the limits of his command, take measures to have this requisition promptly filled by volunteering; for the General commanding the Brigade sincerely hopes that the patriotism and gallantry of the people of this Military District, will be displayed in promptly volunteering their services, and thus obviating the necessity of putting in force the 2nd Section of the order of the Major General commanding the State forces.

SPECIAL ORDERS No. 11.  
I. Brig. Gen. Jno. G. Pratt, Commanding 9th Brigade Militia Troops, will immediately upon receipt of this order, call for volunteers for State service from the several Parishes composing his Brigade, in the following proportions:  
St. Landry, 5 Companies.  
Avoyelles, 5  
Lafayette, 3  
Vermillion, 3  
Calcasieu, 4  
Each company will be composed of four officers, five Sergeants, four corporals, and not less than sixty privates.  
II. If, at the expiration of ten days from the time this order has been received by the companies of your Brigade, the requisite number do not volunteer for duty, you will forthwith proceed to detach from the several companies of the Regiments of your command, a sufficient number of men to constitute the companies required.  
III. In detaching the requisite number of men to make up the companies, you will use your discretion, taking care to detach, as much as practicable, the greater number from those beats in the Parishes which have furnished the smallest number to the Provisional Army.  
IV. As soon as the companies are raised, you will order the Colonels of Regiments to detach from their respective Regiments, the requisite number of company officers for the new companies; but no more than one officer must be taken from any one company.  
V. As soon as the companies are organized, you will report to these Headquarters. The companies will be afterwards formed into Regiments and the Field officers appointed by the Governor.  
VI. You will cause requisitions to be made, on the Adjutant and Inspector Genl., for all necessary equipments to put the troops on a footing for active service.  
VII. Brig. Gen. Pratt will immediately proceed to select an appropriate Camp Ground for the Regiment to be organized under this order and report the same to these Headquarters.
