BRECKENRIDGE IN HAVANA.

REORGANIZATION OF THE ORIGINAL STATE AND UNION BASIS.—The proclamation of Gov. Parsons, of Alabama, is a singularly bold and explicit presentation of the status quo ante bellum as a basis of reorganization.

Gov. Parsons declares that amid all the ruin, suffering and death resulting from the attempt to secede, "every political right which the State possessed under the Federal Constitution is here to-day, with the single exception relating to slavery."

The proclamation of Gov. Parsons will be received at the North as the law, and perhaps as the most distinct form in which the issue has been made between the President's policy and that of the Radicals towards the seceding States.
