Two colored convicts, named Yves Pierre Jacques and Henry Clay, were arrested in Avoyelles parish a few days ago and lodged in our parish jail by deputy sheriff Jeff. Thompson. The former was arrested on Johnson's place near Red River Landing, and the latter on bayou Du Lac. They are both said to be from this parish.

A Grand Jury in New Orleans has indicted E. F. Bigny, Esq., editor of the City Item, for libel, based on an article published in that paper criticizing the action of Judge Baker of the Criminal Court in being a representative of the Picayune for reporting certain testimony brought before the court, and also indicted representatives of the labor organizations in that city for having certain inscriptions on their banners which seemed to reflect upon the court during one of their annual parades. The city press is united in its condemnation of both indictments—the first as a violation of the constitutional liberty of the press, the second as a grave error in attacking the prerogative of the Trades and Labor Councils, but at the same time we do not think that judges should presume much on the rights of the people in condemning their prominence and, often, sound authority. We think both indictments were grave errors, and should have been dropped by the court where they were made. Otherwise, let the whole affair be left to the State to settle.

CURED HYDROPHOBIA.—In the N. O. Picayune of January 30, a correspondent of that city signing himself P. C., says that thirty or forty years ago, Dr. James Ray, a well known physician of Opelousas, was called to see a negro man that had been bitten a few weeks previous by a mad dog, and who exhibited all the symptoms of hydrophobia. The doctor bled him for blood poisoning, and in the meantime the patient—who was a very stout man—became so violent that Dr. Ray had to leave the room, locking the door behind him to prevent the man's escape. The next morning the doctor went back to see the condition of his patient, and found him in a pool of blood and completely exhausted by the loss of so much blood. He applied restoratives and in a few days the man was completely well and never had any more symptoms of hydrophobia. Dr. Ray had just entered the practice of medicine at that time, and bleeding was a very popular remedy with physicians for a number of diseases.

WEATHER NOTES.—January has kept up a programme of bad weather again for the past week, the temperature not being so cold but characterized by a heavy rainfall and continuous damp east winds, with foggy, cloudy days. It is better to have bad weather now than later, when active farming operations have begun. In the meantime, our planters can be repairing fences, clearing ditches, and making the land ready for the plow, which should be started to breaking the soil with the opening of more favorable weather.

Let the low price of cotton for the past season admonish our planters to diversify their crops more and substitute more cereals for the use of the farm, and to raise more pigs and lambs for home consumption and for the home market. Plant more rice, more oats, more millet and corn, and see, for once, if it will not pay better than so much cotton at such low prices.

On another page will be found the letter of James McCabe, Esq., written to the Shenandoah (Iowa) Post, which we alluded to in our last issue. Mr. McCabe, although a Republican in his views, has given a very fair and unprejudiced portrait of the many Louisiana Democrats in his glowing description of things as not at all exaggerated the character of our climate, the fertility of our soil, the hospitality of our citizens, &c. We differ, however, with his opinion expressed in the latter part of his letter, where he says that it would not take more than 100 Republicans from Iowa to change the vote of St. Landry from a Democratic to a Republican majority. With all deference to his opinions, we would state that many northern and western men who name themselves as Republicans became Democrats after a few years' residence in our State. Politics amount to very little in immigration. All we want are good, law-abiding, industrious citizens to help develop our country.

It is gratifying to note that the State Board of Engineers pronounce the levees of the State in better condition than for years past. The State has expended over two hundred thousand dollars on her levees during the past year. In some of the parishes a special levee is collected, while many private individuals have contributed materials and subscribed money for this purpose. During the past two years Toussaint parish has raised \$67,000, which has been spent on her levees. All of the principal breaks, caused by crevasses, have been closed with the exception of Morgauza. And yet we are not happy, because the terrible rising (with a big R) doth exist, and the rule with a rod of iron in the broad domains of the State—Capitolian Advocate.

We understand that our Town Council at their next meeting will make an appropriation to buy lamps to light the town. This is a good idea, and another excellent one would be to make an appropriation to buy a steam fire engine, and we trust that the day is not far distant when our town authorities will take this matter into serious consideration. There is enough money in our town treasury to buy a good engine, and we see no reason why we should be without one. The corporation does not owe a cent and can well afford to spend a little money for the safety of the property of its inhabitants.—Marksville Review.

The whole theory of the Hoar bill is to induce the practical effect of death to the lowest possible point, and thus give the greatest possible security to the quadrennial decisions of the people. Just now it is the Democratic party which is guaranteed stability by the measure, but this is a slight matter. The bill did not, by any proper consideration, raise a party sensation. A Republican Senate originated it, and it must be classed among the non-partisan measures of Congress.—Chicago Inter Ocean, Rep.

Proceedings of the Police Jury.

OPELOUSAS, JAN. 18th, 1886.

The Police Jury met pursuant to adjournment. Present: J. Guilly, President; Auguste Perrodin, S. W. W. Taylor, E. Dubuisson, S. Haas, Louis Young, T. C. Chachere and D. P. Suzin.

The reading of the minutes of the last meeting was dispensed with.

AN ORDINANCE TO assess and levy the amount of taxes to be collected for the services and expenses of the current year, 1886, and to make appropriations for that purpose.

On motion of Mr. Chachere, it was ordered that the sum of \$36,250.00, thirty six thousand Nine Hundred and Fifty dollars be, and the same is hereby assessed and levied as the amount of taxes to be collected for the services and expenses for the current year, 1886, and that the same be appropriated as follows:

Pay of officers and members \$2,000.00
" Public Printing 250.00
" " El Magasin 4,500.00
" " District Attorney 600.00
" " Sheriff's criminal salary 2,000.00
" " " jail 2,000.00
" " District court witnesses 2,200.00
" " Grand and Petit Jurors 2,000.00
" " Internal improvements 8,000.00
" " Existing debts 7,000.00

And that to secure that amount a tax of Ten Mills (10) on the dollar is hereby levied on all property owned by the citizens of the parish, and that the same be collected and paid into the Treasury, to be used for the District Attorney pro tem, in any court of competent jurisdiction in the name of the parish.

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AN ORDINANCE

To provide for the closing and keeping closed of all places of business within the parish of St. Landry, except drug stores, markets and saloons, on the Sabbath day.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Police Jury of the parish of St. Landry, that all keepers of stores, shops, groceries, warehouses, drinking houses, grog shops, lager beer saloons and ice cream saloons, doing business in the parish of St. Landry, are hereby required to close and keep closed and are prohibited from opening their respective places of business, either to give away, sell or buy any goods, wares, merchandise, refreshments, liquors or produce, or to receive or forward any freight on each and every Sabbath day during the year.

Section 2. Be it further ordained that the following persons and none other are exempted from the operation of this ordinance, viz: 1st. Keepers of drug stores, in so far as to permit them to fill prescriptions of licensed physicians and to sell drugs and medicines on said day.

2d. Keepers of bakeries for the sole purpose of making and selling bread.

3d. Keepers of public markets, for the sale of fresh meats, fish, vegetables and fruits.

Section 3. Be it further ordained that any and every person violating this ordinance shall be fined for each and every such violation in a sum not less than one hundred nor more than two hundred and fifty dollars, or in any amount of not less than one month nor more than three months or both at the discretion of the court, one half of the fine to go to the informant and the other half to go to the Parish Treasury, to be used for the District Attorney pro tem, in any court of competent jurisdiction in the name of the parish.

Section 4. Be it further ordained that this ordinance shall take effect from and after Sunday, November the 4th, 1877.

BE IT KNOWN that we, the Jury Commissioners, did, on the 11th day of January, A. D. 1886, meet at the Clerk's office, in the town of Opelousas, parish of St. Landry, for the purpose of drawing a jury for the regular term of the District Court of the 13th Judicial District, under section 5, Act No. 11, of the regular session of 1877, all the members being present except Diemel Durio, James J. Thompson, one of the said commissioners, drew from the general venire box, one at a time, the names of the following fifty persons to compose the Grand and Petit jurors for the first week of the said Court, commencing MONDAY, the 8th day of March, 1886, a list of whom was then and there kept by the Clerk of said Court, James O. Chachere; and in our judgment, a jury being required for the second, third and fourth weeks of the term, we then and there proceeded, as in drawing the first fifty jurors, to draw thirty additional names to serve as petit jurors for the second week, and thirty additional names to serve as petit jurors for the third week, and thirty additional names to serve as petit jurors for the fourth week of the said Court; and we, the Clerk and commissioners, did then and there place the names drawn as aforesaid for each separate week in separate envelopes, and sealed and endorsed the same with the weeks for which they were respectively drawn, which said envelopes, containing said names, were then and there placed in a large box provided for the purpose, which, after depositing said names therein as aforesaid, was locked and sealed by us, and placed in the custody of the clerk of the court for use at said term of the Court.
