The receipt of cotton has dropped off considerably. This means that the bulk of the crop has been harvested and sold, and that, as soon as the Christmas holidays are over, local business men can look forward to a decrease in trade.

We have already commented on the condition of the public roads. Further comment is unnecessary. The roads are still in a state of disrepair, and the work is done the better off will the country be, especially the business and traveling portion of the community.
The recent warm weather induced vegetation to take on an unusual and out-of-season growth. The cold snap of the early part of the week knocked all the greenness out of plants, and after the frost they presented a woebegone appearance.

This is the time of the game-hunting season—the "o" in the land. The fields and prairies abound with game of all descriptions, and the crack of the breech-loader is heard almost incessantly. Good bags are reported.
The egg market, as it usually does towards the holidays, took an upward jump this week. Tuesday the quotations were 15 cents per dozen in the local market and on Wednesday the price rose to 20 cents. They commanded 23 cents in New Orleans on Monday.

Last Saturday was a very quiet day in town. Business circles were dull and visitors from the country scarce. This state of affairs was caused by the bad weather. Wednesday, the first bright day for a week, brought many people to town, and the merchants did a business that paid in every respect for what they didn't transact on Saturday.

Police Jury Cases.

The application for writs of prohibition and rule for contempt against Judge Dupré and District Attorney Gayland for having enjoined the police jury appointed by Governor Foster in July last from filing their seals was passed upon by the Supreme Court on last Monday. The syllabus of the decision, reported in the Times-Democrat, reads as follows:
"All that we decide now is that the district judge was without power or authority by injunction to tie up relations in the exercise of the functions of an office by an injunction, and to force those parties to remain powerless to act until they had affirmatively shown the authority of the Governor to make the appointment."
"It is ordered that the writs which issued herein be perpetuated and that the injunction granted by the district judge be, and the same is hereby, set aside and discharged."

From which it would appear that while the court holds that an inquiry cannot be made into the ability of those appointed by way of an injunction, yet there is another remedy. What the *modus operandi* is can only be ascertained from reading the decision. As soon as it is returned we will give our readers its full intent and meaning.
A private letter from New Orleans which we were permitted to read says that while the rule for contempt was really maintained, the penalty was usually not made. The court contents itself with saying that the Judge and District Attorney are adjudged guilty of contempt and their conduct cannot be permitted to pass uncondemned. Those who expected the Judge and District Attorney imprisoned are doubtless very much disappointed, but their friends and supporters are delighted with the result.

The Constitutional Convention.

Owing to the far-reaching issues involved in the presidential campaign just closed, and the intense feeling naturally engendered over their consideration, the question of a constitutional convention to frame a new organic law for the State has been somewhat obscured.
Although matters pertaining to the calling of such a convention occupied much public attention prior to and during the last session of the legislature, there are many persons who are not familiar with the provisions of an act as finally promulgated calling for its assembling. An impression prevails in the minds of many persons that the convention has been already called, and what remains for the delegates to do is to select the delegates who are to compose the body. This is entirely erroneous. The first section of the act under which the convention is authorized provides that there shall be submitted to the daily qualified electors of the State, at an election to be held on the second Tuesday of January, 1898, for their approval or rejection, a proposition to hold a convention to frame a new Constitution for the State.
The act of the legislature further provides "that on the same day, and at the same time, there shall be held an election of delegates to the proposed convention; and if a majority of the votes cast be in favor of said proposition, the delegates so elected shall receive a plurality of the votes cast at said election shall compose the convention." The convention is to consist of 184 delegates, 98 of whom shall be elected from the parishes, 90 from the districts, as provided for in the representation of the House of Representatives and 36 from the State at large. The delegates are to meet in the city of New Orleans, at a place to be designated by the Governor, on the second Tuesday of February next.

The convention, if it is called by a vote of the people, is given full power to frame and adopt a new Constitution for the State, without submission to the people, except in the following particular: when on the convention is prohibited from enacting or framing any article or ordinance, and every delegate to the convention is required to take an oath that he will obey the limitations imposed upon him by the constitution.
With the bonded indebtedness of the State, or of any parochial, municipal, levee or other political corporation.
With the rate of taxation as now limited by the Constitution, other than for the purpose of paying interest on the municipal bonds, public works and public improvements, upon the approval of the taxpayers affected by such increase.
With the levee system as now organized under Articles 215, 214, 215, 217 and 270 of the present Constitution and laws enacted in pursuance thereof.
With the terms of office of the General Assembly, or any of the present State, district, parochial or municipal officers, whether elected or appointed; nor with the present salaries of said officers prior to the first Tuesday after the third Monday in April, 1890.
With the officers of the Supreme Court, whereby the terms of office of the then incumbent shall be shortened, or their salaries diminished, or these positions made elective.
With the present legal technicalities or exactness of the election law, and the election law, and the Chief Justice, or, in his absence, the Senior Justice of the Supreme Court, will attend the opening of the convention and call the roll of delegates.
Delegates are to be paid \$5 per diem and traveling expenses; but compensation is limited to seventy days. The sum of \$80,000 is appropriated for the expenses of the convention.—New Orleans Times-Democrat.

Thursday evening, Mr. T. J. Labbé was cleaning a can that contained the blue oil, having washed the can for two days with hot water, and after the can had been wiped dry, and every bit of gasoline was thought to have been removed, Mr. Labbé approached a candle to the opening of the can, to look into it. It was perfectly clean, but before he had a chance to peep into the can an explosion took place. But, fortunately, Mr. Labbé was only slightly burned on the right hand.
