Les Pensions aux Soldats Confédérés.

Nous avons reçu bon nombre de demandes d'information au sujet de la loi adoptée par la législature à la session de 1898, ayant trait au paiement de pensions aux vétérans de la confédération et aux veuves des soldats.

L'acte 125 de 1898 n'a pour but que de mettre en effet l'article 303 de la constitution, et en vertu de cet article, les personnes qui entrent dans les conditions suivantes ont droit à cette pension, viz:

Tout soldat ou marin de la confédération qui aura servi honorablement de la date de son enrôlement jusqu'à la fin de la guerre ou jusqu'à sa décharge, dans une organisation militaire faisant partie de l'armée ou de la marine des états confédérés; il devra être dans le besoin et dans l'impossibilité de gagner sa vie par son travail; il ne devra pas être marié ou en d'autre manière entretenue par l'état de la Louisiane, ou par aucun autre état ou aucun gouvernement.

S'il fut enrôlé dans une compagnie faisant partie du contingent de la Louisiane, il devra avoir une résidence de cinq ans dans l'état à l'époque de son application ou autrement une résidence de quinze ans.

Une pension est aussi accordée aux veuves des soldats confédérés morts avant le premier Juin 1865 de blessures reçues ou de maladies contractées pendant le service militaire, à condition que ces personnes ne se soient pas subéquemment remariées et qu'elles soient dans des conditions nécessitant les veuves de soldats qui firent partie d'organisations militaires de la Louisiane, devront avoir en une résidence de cinq ans en Louisiane au moment de leur application; autrement une résidence de quinze ans.

La pension n'excédera pas la somme de huit piastres par mois, mais comme le montant alloué n'est que de cinquante mille piastres par an elle n'atteindra probablement pas ce chiffre.

Le bureau naval de la Nouvelle-Orléans est toujours sans chef régulier, le président n'ayant pu surmonter suffisamment son chagrin de la défaite de Demas au point d'occuper de lui trouver un successeur. En attendant qu'il se console, le bienheureux Wimberly, en sa qualité de collecteur du port, a désigné comme député à ces importantes fonctions le capitaine Thos. S. Ellis, un patriote qui revient de la guerre chargé de gloire, mais allégué de ressources.

L'archevêque Chapelle de la Nouvelle-Orléans est arrivé à New York mercredi, venant de Rome, où le Saint Père l'a nommé délégué apostolique de Porto Rico et de Cuba. L'épiscopat, a-t-il dit, sera réorganisé dans ces nouvelles possessions sous les principes américains, dont le digne prélat se déclare un des plus fervents admirateurs.

L'hôtel Baldwin, un des plus anciens bâtiments de San Francisco, a été détruit par le feu mercredi matin, avant le jour. Il s'y trouvait environ huit cents personnes qui presque toutes ont réussi à se sauver. Le nombre des morts n'est pas exactement connu encore, mais il ne s'éleva pas à plus de dix.

Blanco a démissionné comme capitaine-général de l'île de Cuba. Ce n'est pas étonnant, car il y a assez longtemps qu'il éprouve des nausées à l'idée d'avoir à se soumettre à l'humiliation de rendre la parole des Antilles aux Américains. Sa retraite n'empêchera pas l'évacuation de l'île de s'effectuer.

Tout espoir de sauver le Maria Thérèse n'a pas été abandonné et la Compagnie Chapman-Merritt a expédié des hommes pour y travailler; au cas de succès la compagnie serait richement rémunérée par le gouvernement.

Le pugiliste James J. Corbett a perdu sa dernière lutte au combat qu'il a eu mardi à New York avec Thomas Sharkey. Il n'est pas battu honnêtement dès le début.

CHARTER

OPELOUSAS PROGRESSIVE LEAGUE.

STATE OF LOUISIANA,
PARISH OF ST. LANDRY.

Be it known that on this 19th day of the month of October, in the year of our Lord One thousand Eight hundred and Ninety eight, John W. Lewis, a Notary Public in and for the Parish of St. Landry, Louisiana, personally appeared before me the undersigned, a Justice of the Peace in and for the Parish of St. Landry, Louisiana, who do hereby certify that the persons whose names are hereto signed, all residents of the State of Louisiana, and the parish of St. Landry, who declared that they had adopted the following purpose to organize, manufacture thereon, and especially to promote the erection of a Central Mill and Refinery at Opelousas, and for said purposes they have adopted the following Constitution and Articles of Agreement:

ARTICLE I.—This organization shall be styled THE OPELOUSAS PROGRESSIVE LEAGUE, and all persons may become members who are of legal age, and who will voluntarily agree to pay the same, and pay a membership fee to be hereafter fixed.

ARTICLE II.—The affairs of the organization shall be administered by a President, Vice President, Secretary and a Board of Directors. The President shall consist of the President and the Board of Directors shall consist of the President and the Board of Directors. The Board of Directors shall be composed of the President and the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE III.—The officers and Board of Directors to serve from the present date to the first Tuesday of December 1899 shall be the following: President, Leonce Sandoz, Vice President, J. B. Sandoz, Secretary, J. B. Sandoz, Treasurer, J. B. Sandoz.

ARTICLE IV.—This organization shall have power to acquire property both real and personal, by purchase or by donation, with authority to sell, lease, mortgage, or otherwise dispose of the same, and the rights and authority so granted shall be in full force and effect for the purposes herein set forth.

ARTICLE V.—The President of the corporation shall have authority to execute a deed or conveyance to property or disposing of the same by deed or conveyance, and the Board of Directors shall have authority to call a special meeting of the members of the corporation.

ARTICLE VI.—The Board of Directors shall establish an office in the Parish of St. Landry, and the Board shall meet at such time as the President shall deem it necessary to do so, and the President shall have authority to call a special meeting of the members of the corporation.

ARTICLE VII.—All persons becoming members shall pay a membership fee to be fixed by the Board of Directors, and shall thereafter pay the same to the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE VIII.—The term of existence of this corporation shall be five years, and unless extended or amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members of the League.

ARTICLE IX.—The President shall be elected by the members of the League, and shall hold office for one year, and shall be eligible for re-election.

ARTICLE X.—The President shall be elected by the members of the League, and shall hold office for one year, and shall be eligible for re-election.

ARTICLE XI.—These articles may be amended or abrogated by a vote of two-thirds of the members of the League.
