Farmers' Institute.

A Farmers' Institute will be held in Opelousas Saturday, Sept. 29th, 1900, under the auspices of the State Department of Agriculture. The Institute will be held at the Farmers' Institute in Opelousas, and the present Commissioner of Agriculture and Immigration, will conduct the Institute, which will partake of the nature of a Parish Fair. The \$250.00 subscribed by the citizens of Opelousas and the \$50.00 subscribed by the Police Jury will be distributed in premiums in the manner prescribed by the Police Jury; as this is intended as the thin edge of the entering wedge of a movement to hold annual Parish Fairs in St. Landry, where the staple and products of Home, Farm and Ranch can be brought into friendly competition, to the end that the magnificent resources of the Empire Parish can be exploited and exhibited to the world; industry and improvement in farming methods improved; and friendly relations cultivated between the farmers of different sections of the parish, the co-operation of all progressive citizens is asked. It is to be hoped that each ward of the parish will be represented by exhibitors, and Police Jurors are respectfully asked to serve as a committee of one for their respective wards to see that the said wards are properly represented.

The following extracts from minutes of Police Jury and the letter of Chairman of the Committee on Awards are self-explanatory, to-wit:

"On motion of Mr. Haas, duly seconded and carried.

WHEREAS, the citizens of Opelousas have subscribed two hundred and fifty dollars toward a fund for the payment of premiums to the farmers of the parish on crops and live stock, to be distributed under the direction of the Police Jury in the year 1900; be it

Resolved, That the Police Jury will accept said fund for said purpose.

Resolved, further, That the Jury will add fifty dollars to said fund, and that the Chair appoint a committee of three members of this body and two others to formulate a plan for the awarding of said premiums, with instructions to report to this body at its next meeting.

Chair appointed Messrs. Thos. H. Lewis, Chairman; S. Haas, Wm. M. Prescott, J. O. Chachere and L. J. Dosman.

To the President and members of the Police Jury, The committee appointed by your honorable body July 17, 1899, to formulate a plan for the awarding of premiums to farmers on farm produce and live stock through to report the following plan for distribution of said premiums: They recommend that the premiums on farm products and live stock be divided into first and second prizes, and that in awarding the premiums on farm products, quality and quantity produced will be considered, and they recommended the offer of the following premiums:

Best sample field corn 1st premium, \$25; 2d premium, \$15.

Best sample cotton, 1st premium, \$25; 2d premium, \$15.

Best sample sugar cane, 1st premium, \$25; 2d premium, \$15.

Best sample sweet potatoes, 1st premium, \$20; 2d premium, \$10.

Best sample Irish potatoes, 1st premium, \$20; 2d premium, \$15.

Best sample rice, 1st premium, \$20; 2d premium, \$15.

Best native milk cow, \$50.

Best native 3 year old horse, \$50.

Best native milch cow, \$50.

The Committee further recommends that the Jury appoint three judges residing in the rice-producing section of the rice crops, and that three other judges be appointed to make the other awards offered.

A Health Record Breaker.

The deaths in New Orleans for the week ending August 12th, reached the lowest figure known. There were in all only 83 deaths, making the death rate per 1000 per annum 13.13 for the whites and 14.39 for the entire population, white and black. The total includes five deaths by accident or suicide, leaving the mortality from disease at only 78, or 12.5 thousand for the whites, which would give an average duration of life of 84 years; that is, if this low rate of mortality could be kept up in New Orleans for a long period of time the average white person here would reach the age of 84.

It is to be remembered that the figures for New Orleans are not based on inflated estimates of population. The census has just shown that Cincinnati inflated its population 80,000, and its death rate was based on these exaggerated figures, with the result of making the city appear far healthier than it really is. Chicago is also found to have inflated its population 389,000. With such swollen figures it is easily possible to make a good sanitary record, for the deaths of 3,000,000 are large for one of 1,000,000. On the other hand, the death rate in New Orleans is based on very nearly the same population as the last census gave the city. Our Board of Health indulges in no wild guesses or inflation, and the estimate will certainly not be 10,000 out of the way from the actual total returned; indeed, such hints as have come out in regard to the census indicate that the estimated population upon which the Board of Health is based is its figures below instead of above its actual population.

But to return to the report. It shows, what has frequently been shown before, that the summer is the healthiest season in New Orleans, its death rate falling to its lowest point during the warm part of the winter. Taking last week as a sample, when two-thirds of the country was suffering from one of the worst hot waves ever known, while persons were dying by the hundreds in Chicago, New York and other Northern and Western cities from sunstroke and other heat diseases, there was not a single death from any heat malady in New Orleans; indeed, cholera infantum, the scourge of New York during the hot weather and far more murderous to the children than King's Heretic, claimed but two victims in New Orleans for the whole week.

We would say further that for a number of weeks previous the returns have been nearly equally satisfactory, but not quite as good for the week, which is recalled in our report of the record breaker.—N. O. Times-Democrat.

In justice to me, please publish this article. Very truly, JAMES DARBY, Mr. Sibille's Charge.

Editor Clifton.—There appeared a communication in last week's Courier, in which Mr. Sibille, of Sunset, which is so grossly unfair, and so wrong on the facts, that I am constrained to honor it with a reply.

Jealousy is indeed an arch fiend; it will lead an individual to go to the utmost extreme, and this is certainly an example of it.

The facts of the case are as follows: In June last I ordered a car of lumber for the parish, amounting to 11,634 feet. When Mr. Skiles, the lumber dealer of Opelousas, who filled the order, sent the car, he included 1,788 feet of lumber for Miller & Castille, and that amount was delivered to them by me. When the Police Jury met, I requested Mr. Skiles to make out the parish bill. When he rendered the bill I did not notice that he included the 1,788 feet of Miller & Castille, and I had the bill approved and paid in this shape. Some weeks after, (in July) I noticed the error, and promptly bought from D. J. Higginbotham 1,788 feet of lumber, to replace the error, and I am now using the lumber for the building of the Bondurant bridge. I have the bills and documents to substantiate what I say, and had Mr. Sibille been anxious to tell the truth, he would have inquired before rushing in to print.

As to the statement that I overcharged the parish, that is equally untrue. I paid Mr. Skiles \$14.00 for the lumber, and charged the parish \$15.00 for it—in other words \$1.00 for unloading and delivering same to the over-seer—and it is needless to say that I did not make a cent profit.

Now, Mr. Editor, I can show the *raison d'être* for all this. As I first stated, it is a case of pure, mean jealousy and pique. During the incumbency of Adeline Gentry as police juror, Mr. Sibille had himself appointed road overseer over some forty miles of road! As he is a lumber dealer, he of course furnished lumber for this vast stretch, and made considerable of a "spec" of it. I cut him out of this—and thereby hang a tale.
