BIG AFRICAN LAKES.
TRAVELER'S SOLUTION OF THE TANGANYIKA MYSTERY.
Fauna of the Big Lakes Found to Be Wholly Lacustrine—Volcanoes Dam Up a Stream and Turn the Water the Other Way.

The mystery that has always surrounded the great lakes of Central Africa is largely solved in the new number of the Geographical Journal by Mr. J. E. S. Moore. His explorations have linked together much information previously rather fragmentary. Tanganyika was discovered by Burton and Speke in 1857, and the latter brought to England a few shells picked up on its shore, which found their way to the British museum. Some of them puzzled the experts, for, though taken from a fresh water lake very far inland, they strongly resembled genera which inhabit the sea. They had also a curiously old world aspect, as if they were lineal descendants of shells which lived about the time when the limestones called coelites were formed, or considerably before our chalk was deposited. But the little known about Africa had led geologists to suppose that, at any rate, the central and southern parts had been above the sea far longer than this. In course of time, however, more discoveries were made in Tanganyika, including shells of similar types, peculiar fishes, crabs, prawns, sponges, and even a jelly fish—in fact, a number of creatures, all suggesting that their ancestors had been marine. Then in 1897 Mr. Moore visited the lake and brought back collections which placed the matter beyond doubt. But the settlement of that question only raised another. In what way did Tanganyika communicate with the sea? Some ten years ago Prof. Sauer, of Vienna, by piecing together the information gathered by travelers in the more central parts of Africa, came to the conclusion that the continent on its eastern side was traversed by a remarkable group of rifts, which had resulted in the formation of valleys. In these lay the longer and narrower of the African lakes. He traced the "rift system" from Syria, along the valley of the Jordan, down the Red Sea, southward into Africa. Near Lake Rudolf it divides the two branches opening out to inclose a broad tract of highlands in the middle of which is the wide Victoria Nyanza. The western arm passes through the Albert lake, Kivu and Tanganyika, turning eastward from the south end of the last to the head of Nyassa. Here it is very probably joined by the eastern branch, which can be traced for a long way, passing to the west of Kenya and Kilimanjaro. These great rifts would seem to be the natural lines of connection with the ancient ocean, and, if so, that could be traced by seeing which of the lakes contained the strange creatures of Tanganyika. So a second expedition was organized, headed by Mr. Moore to examine the whole chain of lakes along the western "Rift Valley," from Nyassa to the Albert Nyanza. His former expedition had made it almost certain that Nyassa had never been in communication with the sea. Consequently, the way could not have been from the south. In Tanganyika he found still more evidence of an ancient marine fauna which had tenanted its waters at a time when the lake covered a much larger area. But neither in Kivu nor in the Albert Edward lake, nor in the Albert Nyanza could he discover any traces of these marine creatures. Their fauna, like that of Nyassa, was wholly lacustrine. More than that, Mr. Moore found that the river draining Kivu descends as a torrent through an upland region to the old head of Tanganyika and that the former lake is cut off from the Albert Edward by a huge mass of volcanoes some of which are still active. Strange as it may seem he gives good reasons for believing that Kivu had been formed by the outbreathing of these volcanoes, which have dammed up a stream that formerly ran to the north till the water at last found an outlet in the opposite direction down to Tanganyika. Thus, strange as it may seem, the sea can only have lain to the west, over the present basin of the Congo.—London Standard.

School Bell Rings by Electricity.
Near Roanoke, Ill., near the center of the state, there is a school teacher whose ingenuity might not please all of his pupils—that is, the indolent ones. E. N. Wheelwright teaches a district school, and in a district school, you know—or perhaps some city children do not know—the teacher has to ring the bell and build the fire and sweep the floor, unless he pays some ambitious boy to do it for him. But this teacher does not have to hire a boy to ring the bell, nor does he ring it himself, yet, no matter what he may be doing at 9 o'clock in the morning, the bell sets up a clatter that no boy or girl can escape. Mr. Wheelwright has arranged a clock which at the proper hour sets in motion an electric apparatus that puts the bell to ringing. The boys of that district have no longer any hope that the teacher will be so engrossed in some task that he will forget to call school. The bell rings also at 10:45 a. m., 1 p. m., 2:30 p. m. and at 4 o'clock.

FARM TOPICS
When Not to Sell Stock

To sell young stock, instead of waiting until the animals have matured, is to sacrifice a portion of the profit. No young calves should be sold, as they grow and gain rapidly, while the pig will pay better as a food consumer, having a greater value as a hog than when but a few months old.

Getting the Richest Milk.
The richest milk is that taken last while milking. The "strippings" contain three times as much butter fat as the first milk drawn. It is important, therefore, that each cow be milked to the last drop, not only because the milk will be richer, but also because the milking period of the cow will also be extended compared with careless milking.

Meat of Diseased Animals.
Mr. T. B. Terry, in the Practical Farmer, makes a most vigorous protest against the doctrine that he finds in one of the agricultural papers, that the meat and bones of animals that die of disease may be used as food for hogs and hogs, and very properly says: "It must turn the stomachs of thoughtful people against pork, poultry and eggs of the market." In this we thoroughly agree with him, and we would favor a law to prevent such use of the diseased animals, or even a meat that had begun to decay, as much as we would a law to prevent it from being sold for food purposes. In fact, using it in this way to produce food products is no better than to use the meat itself, and perhaps worse, because the meat might warn consumers away by its appearance or its odor, but when they are disguised in eggs or the flesh of other animals we may not receive that warning, and yet we cannot escape the disease germs or bacteria which are transmitted from one to the other, and possibly increased in their poisonous properties instead of weakened. It is this which makes the writer of Poultry Points so much opposed to the feeding of raw meat to fowl. If the hens are fed upon beefsteak the eggs will be as wholesome as the meat was, and if they are fed upon rotten, stinking meat, we want none of them.—American Cultivator.

The Henhouse Windows.
The window here illustrated was recently described as in use by a noted poultry fancier. The method of construction is here pictured. The window is low, and has the sashes hinged, so that one may step out into the yard from the henhouse through the window. The upper sash is hinged at the top and swings out, being held up by an arm screwed to the casing. The lower sash is hinged at one side and swings out. This plan will work well under many circumstances where the

SCIENCE AND INDUSTRY.
In the manufacture of Great Britain alone the power which steam exerts is estimated to be equal to the manual labor of 4,000,000 men, or more than double the number of males supposed to inhabit the globe.

There have been rapid strides in the iron and steel industry in South Russia during the past five years. No fewer than 14 ironworks have been started, while the quartet of pre-existing works have doubled the number of their blast furnaces.

The consumption of ice in Brazil is constantly increasing. This is due principally to the demand for ice in restaurants, hotels and other public places. Foreigners are most insistent in their calls for ice. Our consul at Santos is of the opinion that an ice company would place a profitable undertaking in that place, the use of ice being practically unknown in the fish, vegetable and meat markets. He also thinks the American refrigerator would sell well in Brazil.

Spiders are met with in the forests of Java whose webs are so strong that it requires a knife to cut through them, we are told. A spider weighing four pounds, which has taken up her residence in a cathedral at Munich, regales herself with a large supply of lamp oil. A Texas spider weaves a balloon four feet long and two feet wide, which she fastens to a tree by a single thread, then marches on board with her half dozen little ones, cuts the thread, and away goes the airship to some distant point on the prairie.

In the light of the recent report of Major Reed, regarding the failure of the "electrical purification" of the harbor of Havana, which is practically an enormous cesspool, it is worth remembering that the Hermitic electrolytic process for the purification of sewage, which is practically identical with the Woolf process used at Havana, was carefully tested and found unsatisfactory some years ago in England. Major Reed's report says that the purification of the Woolf process is "inadequate" and the better results at a less cost could have been obtained by the simple use of chloride of lime. A little time spent in looking up the literature of the subject would have evidently saved some disappointment, if not more.

Professor Pictet of Geneva is reported to have devised a new plan by which oxygen may be produced on the commercial scale and at a cost which will greatly increase its use. While in New York City, Professor Pictet demonstrated on the small scale a method for the production of oxygen, by bubbling air through liquid air, by which the air separated into its two constituents; the nitrogen flowing out through a tube at the top of the chamber, and the oxygen through a tube at the bottom. Apparently, practical difficulties were encountered which prevented its application. His new method is to drive the air into a condenser, which is cooled on the outside by liquid air. The low temperature causes the oxygen of the air to separate by gravity from the nitrogen. It is then drawn off from the bottom of the condenser, and the nitrogen from the top, while any carbonic acid present, made liquid by the low temperature, is drawn into tubes. As a 500-horse power engine will make 500,000 cubic feet of oxygen a day, it seems that the process is not expensive.

Farming in the Past Decade.
The last 10 years have witnessed a great many changes in the number, size and location of farms. In the later settled states and territories many new farms were opened by settlement on the public domain. In the older settled sections of the Southern and North Central states a large number of new farms were called into being by the subdivision of the old estates into smaller holdings. In the same parts of the country the area of improved land was considerably extended and the value of farm investments largely increased. The net additions to farm resources in the decade, stated in millions of dollars, will exceed the reported value of all farm investments in 1850. In other words, the increased wealth of our farmers, as the result of their last 10 years' labor, equals the farm wealth of the nation reported as the outcome of their toil and economies from the settlement at Jamestown to the middle of the 19th century.

What has been the effect of these changes upon the social and economic conditions of the masses engaged in the cultivation of the soil? The people of this country are deeply interested in the question, and for the answer thereto will eagerly scan the bulletins of the census of agriculture, which will begin to appear in a very few months.—Reviews of Reviews.

Co-operation in Farming.
The Dane thoroughly understands the value of co-operation. Butter was at first made on every farm but partly owing to the difficulty of procuring trained butter makers, partly to the smallness of the farms, Danish butter was at first of uncertain quality and fetched a low price in England. So the go-ahead Danish farmer combined with his fellows, and at the present day almost every parish has its co-operative dairy. On an average 150 small farmers combine together to establish a dairy, subscribing between them £1200, that is £8 each, this being enough capital for a dairy of 850 cows. A co-operative society has also been formed for organized egg collecting for export. Local societies are established all over the country, whose members engage to deliver fresh eggs. They are fined £5 for every bad egg delivered after fair warning.—London Express.

A New Theory About Coal.
H. W. Pearson of Duluth, Minn., is suing the Great Northern Railroad for 10 percent of the alleged value of some coal lands that he claims to have discovered in Montana on an entirely new theory. This theory, to which he has applied himself for 20 years, is that the coal beds were formed by flood-wood, or drift-wood carried by repeated floods, and deposited in pockets by the currents.



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Experience With a Hand Separator.
A writer in the Farmer's Guide relates his experience with the hand separator. When he was setting his milk, skimming and churning the cream he found by a two months' record that he made a pound of butter from a little over twenty-four pounds of milk. For the same length of time when using the separator he made a pound of butter from eighteen pounds of milk, which was a gain of about thirty per cent. This increase was not kept up through the summer, but he had averaged a gain of twenty per cent. for fifteen months in the amount of butter made from the same weight of milk. He also learned another thing from his daily record of weight of milk and amount of butter made. He did not feed any grain during the summer while cows were on grass last year, and it required from twenty-one to twenty-five pounds of milk to make a pound of butter, but he began to feed grain in October, and as he gradually approached full rations the amount of butter increased, until in January he could make a pound of butter from 17.8 pounds of milk. The churn test from June 1 to September 30 showed 4.8 pounds of butter made to each 100 pounds of milk, and from October 1 to January 31, 5.1 pounds, a gain of four-fifths of a pound to each 100 pounds of milk. While some part of this gain may have been due to the cows being further advanced in lactation, he believes, as we do, that some part of it was due to the better feeding.

Finland's Stamp of Mourning.
When the measure abolishing Finnish postage stamps was promulgated, the Finns issued a black stamp with the words "Suomi-Finland" and the national coat of arms on it. This stamp they affixed to the top right corner of the envelope simply as a sign of mourning and protest, while affixing the Russian stamp on the centre of the other side of the envelope. The Imperial Government got alarmed, as it always does, at such purely sentimental manifestations of national feeling, and in a few days interdicted the practice.—The Anglo-Russian.
