The Road Question.

Mr. Editor:—I understand that a move is on foot to have the recently adopted road ordinance repealed at the December meeting of the police jury. As I have been an ardent advocate and supporter of this measure, I beg to be allowed space in your columns for a few thoughts on the subject. When the present system of working the roads was adopted the country was sparsely settled, but few roads were required, and these needed but little labor to keep them in passable order. Now, however, the vast prairies as well as the swamps and marshes having been cleared and cultivated, many new roads are needed, and the police jury, having this matter in charge, is being blamed on every hand for not making turpitudes out of all them. Road overseers, too, come in for their share of blame, and it has got so that it is a very difficult matter to find a good man who will accept the position. Occasionally, an overseer who is notoriously derelict is prosecuted; bond is furnished, and that is the last of it. The people are tired of the antiquated system, and it is well they are. Under that system the man who owns one cart, one rig, or one buggy, and the man who owns none at all, are both required to work twelve days on the roads. Their neighbors, who may own two or three buggies or carriages and ten or twelve carts or wagons, are also required to furnish twelve days' labor—more, although they may have from two to ten times as much use for the roads. Under the new system, the man who owns a vehicle, the one-gig man and the ten-wagon man all pay \$1.00 per annum as a road tax. In addition to this the ten wagon man pays \$10 as a license for his wagons to use the roads and the one-gig man pays 50 cents for the same privilege; but the man who owns no vehicle pays nothing more. Under that system the poor ignorant man who owns no vehicle and he who owns one, two, three or four are being misled by the cry that this is an imposition, an extra tax, when the poor are already overburdened with taxes. Why, then, is not a money man in each parish but would prefer to pay two or three times the amount he will be called upon to pay under the new system, rather than work twelve days on the roads, and that frequently at a time when his crop demands his immediate attention?

I sincerely hope that the members of the police jury who voted to adopt this measure will remain firm and allow it to be tried for a year or two at least. Some of the members, I know not who, have already been criticised as "bums on legs," and should they now go back on this measure somebody might with at least equal propriety call them "jumping-jacks," as a similar ordinance has already once before been adopted and repealed. Under the old law, the inhabitants of incorporated towns paid no road tax, being taxed for the maintenance of their own streets and bridges. Under the new law, they will be required to pay a license for everyone of their vehicles that ventures outside of their corporate limits—and nearly every one of them will at one time or another do that. This means that an enormous additional tax will be levied upon these towns—and yet I have heard no complaint from them. Evidently, they realize the necessity for good roads, and they understand fully that these cannot be had without money, and a good deal of it.
