Correspondence.

Editor COURIER: I understand that the resolution passed by the Board of Aldermen concerning the appropriation of \$4000 for the building of sidewalks provides that these walks should be placed along the principal streets, but not along the business blocks of those streets. There is only one exception to this rule, and that is one incorporated by the Mayor himself, I learn. This exception applies to the sidewalks on Main street, between Laundry and North, where it is proposed to "fill in" with plank sidewalks. There are no sidewalks now; the resolution provides further, that where the property owners between those streets desire to build better walks that they shall be permitted to do so—the cost of putting down the plank walk to be applied towards paying for the better one, the property owners paying the difference.

Now, I have only this observation to make: If the town is to pay the entire cost of building the sidewalks, and bonds are to be issued for that purpose, what objection can there be to the resolution above referred to? I think you believe that the property owner should pay a part of the cost of putting down pavements may consistently object to the plan adopted by the Board, but those political economists who believe that the entire cost should be paid out of the revenue derived from the sale of the bonds should not be hostile to this resolution, because some of the most frequent streets are being provided with plank sidewalks without even issuing bonds to pay for same. Prof. Hammond and those who believe as he does should be consistent.


