Rules for the Primary Election.

Rules governing the primary election to be held July 30, 1904, for the selection of Democratic nominees for Judge and District Attorney, 16th Judicial District of Louisiana:

Sec. 1. Be it resolved, That a white Democratic election be held throughout the parish of St. Landry at the regular polling places now established by law, on July 30, 1904, for the purpose of selecting the nominees of the Democratic party for Judge and District Attorney of the 16th Judicial District of Louisiana.

Sec. 2. That said primary election shall be conducted under the primary law of the State.

Sec. 3. That the polls shall be opened at 7 a. m. and closed at 6 p. m.

Sec. 4. That said election shall be conducted by commissioners and clerks to be selected by a committee to be hereinafter appointed, whose duty it shall be to appoint said commissioners and clerks, to estimate the cost of holding said election, attend to the printing and distribution of the tickets and ballot boxes, and to fix and collect the assessment of the various candidates.

Sec. 5. That the qualification of voters at said primary election shall consist of the following: 1st. He shall be a white Democrat. 2d. He shall be a duly registered voter. 3d. If between the ages of twenty-three and sixty, he shall have paid his poll tax for the year 1903 and 1904, prior to January 1, 1903 and 1904, respectively; if over the age of sixty he shall not be required to produce any poll-tax receipt, and if under the age of twenty-three he shall have paid his poll tax assessed against him prior to January 1st of the year following that for which he was assessed, that is to say, if twenty-one years of age subsequent to January 1, 1904, he will be required to produce a poll-tax receipt, but if he is in his twenty-second year at that date, he shall be required to produce the poll-tax receipt of 1903, payable prior to January 1, 1904.

Sec. 6. That in case any one attempting to vote shall be challenged, the test shall be: "Are you a Democrat?" If you answer in the affirmative, the Democratic party?" And if the answers be in the affirmative, after being duly sworn in writing and signed by the voter, he shall be permitted to vote, and the commissioner shall place in the ballot box in the event any voter is challenged for non-payment of poll tax, he shall exhibit to the commissioners of said election his poll-tax receipts or a certificate from the collector of taxes showing such payment and date thereof.

Sec. 7. That a duly certified list shall be furnished to the commissioners at each voting precinct by the committee selected to supervise this election, showing the names of all persons who have paid their poll tax for the years 1903 and 1904, prior to January 1, 1903 and 1904, respectively, and all persons having the other legal qualifications, whose names appear on said list, shall be entitled to vote without producing their poll-tax receipts, provided that any person having all other legal qualifications, whose name does not appear on said list, may vote upon production of their poll-tax receipts for the years above stated, showing payment prior to January 1, 1903 and 1904, respectively.

Sec. 8. That at the respective polling booths shall be posted in accordance with the regular election law, and no one except those voting, commissioners and clerk shall be allowed within the barrier. The voter shall have the right to prepare his ticket, and shall be permitted to come within the barrier with his ticket already prepared, unaccompanied by any one, and deposit his ballot in the box. No other person shall be permitted to accompany said voter, or to in any manner interfere with him after he has entered the barrier to deposit his ballot.

Sec. 9. That the name of all candidates shall be printed on one ticket, in alphabetical order, under the head of each office, and said tickets shall be distributed to the various candidates not before the 30th day of July, 1904, and shall be delivered to the commissioners at the various polling places by a committee appointed by this committee.

Sec. 10. That one box shall be provided for each of the polling places, as now fixed by law, for the holding of this election, and in which shall be deposited in said box by the elector in person. That in voting, the person voting shall scratch out the names of those for whom he does not wish to vote.

Sec. 11. That a duplicate list of the voters shall be kept by the commissioners and clerk at each polling place, numbered consecutively, one of which shall be forwarded to the chairman of this committee and one deposited in the ballot-box with the tickets voted at said election.

That the ballot boxes shall be returned, duly sealed and signed by the commissioners and clerk, and deposited in the clerk's office, with all the tickets voted at said election, as also a list of the voters at said precinct, and a tally sheet showing the result of said election, sworn to and signed by the commissioners and clerk thereof.

That the tally sheets shall be made of the number of votes cast for each candidate in duplicate, one to be deposited in the ballot-box, as hereinabove provided, and the other to be forwarded to the chairman of this committee. Said tally sheets to be duly sworn to and signed by the commissioners and clerk holding said election.

Sec. 12. That immediately after the closing of the polls the commissioners shall proceed to the counting of the ballots, which shall be done in public.

Sec. 13. That the sheriff of St. Landry parish is requested to furnish a complete list of each poll-tax payer, for each polling place, for the years 1903 and 1904, to the commissioners, and the assessor to furnish a list of polls of each registered voter now on the books or who may register prior to January 25, 1904.

Sec. 14. That the following-named persons, to-wit: Laurent Stagg, John W. Lewis and L. Austin Fontenot are hereby appointed a committee whose duty it shall be to estimate the cost of holding said election, attend to the printing and distribution of the tickets and ballot boxes; fix and collect the assessment of the various candidates, and name the commissioners and clerks of said election.

That Laurent Stagg shall be chairman of said committee.

Sec. 15. That all candidates for office to be voted for at said primary shall file their names with the chairman of this committee on or before the 30th day of July, 1904, and each candidate shall be required to pay to the chairman the cost of on or before the 30th day of July, 1904, whatever amount is assessed against him, and unless both these requirements are fulfilled his name shall not be allowed on said tickets, the said amount to be used for the purpose of paying the expenses of said primary.

Sec. 16. That no candidate shall be declared elected unless he has received a majority of all the votes cast for said office.

Sec. 17. That all returns, boxes, etc., shall be sent in by Wednesday, August 3, 1904, at 12 p. m., and boxes delivered to the clerk of court by one or more of the commissioners.

Sec. 18. That the Parish Executive Committee shall meet at the Courthouse at Opelousas, La., on Wednesday, Aug. 3, 1904, for the purpose of canvassing the returns and promulgating the results.

Sec. 19. That in the event of no one receiving a majority of the votes cast for the office for which he runs, then the two highest candidates for such office shall run in a second primary, which shall be held on August 15, 1904, and none shall be allowed to run in such second primary save the two highest who ran in the first, and all expense shall be borne by those running therein.

Sec. 20. In case of one of the two receiving the highest number of votes refuses to run in the second primary, the other shall be declared the nominee.

Sec. 21. That this primary election shall be conducted by this committee, on both the first and second primary, if any be necessary, and this committee shall be *functus officio* after the promulgation of the result of the second primary.
