Get-Rich-Quick Humbug

In response to inquiries about the status of the get-rich-quick scheme that I have worked up here, with the Clarion's endorsement, we reproduce an article from the COURIER published in June, 1904, throwing some light on the subject. Since this article was published more recent developments have established its fraudulent character so convincingly that we are astonished anyone should be so verdant as to risk their money in it.

An article in last Saturday's Clarion signed "Jacob's News Depot Co.," evidently intended to gull the greensies, undertakes to demonstrate that a forty thousand dollar scheme of building three apartment stores and an opera house to rent, and also to business now known as "Jacob's News Depot Co.," all considered in one big enterprise, will bring a revenue of \$3785, as follows:

Three stores at \$40 per month.....\$1,440 One opera house to rent.....\$1,400 Net profits of the past business.....\$1,400

According to past dividends—total.....\$1785 That looks nice—on paper—but how about the facts. There are at present at least half a dozen eligible, centrally located store buildings in Opelousas, some of which may be rented for a great deal less than \$40 per month, some of them for half that amount or less, several in the center of town, on Main street, and others in the best business centers outside of Main street. Store buildings are not in demand. How will the opera house be able to bring a yearly revenue of \$1,400? We are told it is an opera house that did not cost one-sixth of \$40,000, with a capacity to accommodate any audience ever assembled in Opelousas, and it may be many years before the capacity of the opera house is larger than the capacity of the opera building, and although it has been under an experienced and competent manager for years, the profits have never reached four per cent on the capital invested, after deducting insurance, taxes, licenses, repairs, etc. One opera house at \$5000 or \$6000 does not pay four per cent profit, how will a \$40,000 building, with the business divided between two opera houses, bring \$1000 a year profit?

The gullible may bite at "Jacob's News Depot Co." project, but the man who has capital to invest will not put it in any such visionary scheme. If the third enumerated item, entitled "Net profits of the past business," \$1345, is calculated on the same basis as the other items, the stockholders who may put their money in the scheme, speculation may find themselves the same fix as the stockholders in that other grand scheme which was worked up here several years ago under the title of the "St. Landry Clarion Co.," and which the stockholders of that company how much they have realized on their investment. A large number of our citizens put money in the concern, but we have never heard that any of them ever received a cent in return, nor have we ever heard any reason advanced why the stockholders have received no dividends.

In justice to some of the gentlemen whose names are being paraded as endorsers of the scheme by "Jacob's News Depot Co.," we will say that they disclaim any connection with the project, and the organization camps and 15,000 who do not, or something less than 100,000 of the host who wore the gray still alive. There is ample room in Opelousas for the profitable investment of capital. We need a good hotel building. A furniture factory would pay. A brick factory would yield liberal profits. A broom factory would prove a success. A wagon factory would do well. All these enterprises would give employment to many of our people and out money in circulation the year round. We might enumerate several other industries that would require no great amount of capital, which would build up the town and parish, where idle capital could be profitably invested if managed by responsible and competent men. But let us have no more wild enterprises engineered by irresponsible visionary schemers.
