**Newspaper Law.**

1. Subscribers who do not give express notice to the contrary are considered as wishing to continue their subscriptions.  
2. If subscribers order the discontinuance of their periodicals, the publisher may continue to send them until all arrearages are paid.  
3. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take periodicals from the office to which they are directed, they are held responsible until they have settled the bills and ordered them discontinued.  
4. If subscribers move to another place without informing the publishers and the papers are sent to the former direction, they are held responsible.  
5. The courts have decided that "refusing to take the periodicals from the office or removing and leaving them uncollected for" is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud.  
6. Any person who receives a newspaper and does not see it is held in law to be a subscriber.  
7. If subscribers pay in advance they are presumed to be subscribers until the end of their time if they do not wish to continue taking it; otherwise the publisher is authorized to continue sending it, and the subscriber will be responsible until an express notice, with payment of all arrears, are sent to the publisher.

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
