Newspaper Law.

1. Subscribers who do not give express notice to the contrary are considered as wishing to continue their subscription until the expiration of their periodicals, the publisher may continue to send them until all arrears are paid.
2. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take periodicals from the office to which they are directed, they are held responsible until they have notified the publisher and ordered them discontinued.
3. If subscribers move to another place without informing the publishers and the papers are sent to the former direction, they are held responsible.
4. The courts have decided that "refusing to take the periodicals from the office or removing and leaving them uncollected" is prima facie evidence of discontinuance.
5. Any person who receives a newspaper and makes use of it whether he has ordered it or not is held in law to be a subscriber.
6. If subscribers pay in advance they are bound to give notice to the publisher at the end of their time if they do not wish to continue taking it; otherwise the publisher is authorized to continue sending it, and the subscriber will be responsible until an express notice, with payment of all arrears, are sent to the publisher.

Lady Henry Somerset's Successor

An account of the life and surroundings of the Countess of Carlisle, who was recently elected to the presidency of the World's Women's Christian Temperance Union, appears in the New Idea Woman's Magazine for March. It will be remembered that this was the office held by Frances Willard for some years before that distinguished woman's death, and that she succeeded by her close friend and disciple, Lady Henry Somerset. It appears that the new president brings to the post a considerable amount of family social and philanthropic prestige, as both the Earl of Carlisle and his son, the Hon. Geoffrey Howard, who is a member of the British House of Commons, are well-known supporters of the temperance cause. Lady Carlisle is also known for her democratic tendencies and advocacy of the progress of women generally.

The penitentiary business still continues to be a paying business for the state of Louisiana. The cash receipts from its various farms during 1906 were \$388,441.63, leaving a balance of approximately \$75,000 profit for the year. Of the operating expenses, over forty per cent went for salaries of guards, managers, wardens and members of the board. If, with this extra expense, the board can show a profit of twenty-five per cent on its income, consider how ordinary farming ought to pay, and does pay, in Louisiana.—Lake Charles American.

The Youth's Companion's Portraits of Washington

The Washington's Birthday Number of the Youth's Companion reproduces eight different portraits of George Washington out of the list of more than eight hundred which are in existence. Besides the familiar drawing from Houdon's bust and the portrait by Gilbert Stuart, the Companion offers six which are not so well known. One of these, from a painting by Charles W. Peale, is the earliest known representation of Washington's features. He was at the time about forty years old. A still more interesting portrait is the reproduction of the drawing of the cause of the portrait of Saint-Mémin, a young French artist, in 1788—the last portrait from life that we have. Saint-Mémin in producing it used an instrument that he called a physiognoscope. It enabled him to trace on paper an exact reproduction of the outlines of the face. He afterward filled in the details with crayons. This portrait shows how the first President looked the year before his death.
