MR. BRYAN'S OPINIONS

The plan of guaranteed bank deposit has probably found favor, among all classes of people and irrespective of political affiliation, more rapidly than any other public question.

The new state of Oklahoma has already enacted a law taxing state banks, the fund thus accumulated to be used in paying the depositors of any state bank that from any cause becomes unable to meet its obligations. A special session of the Kansas legislature has been called for the purpose of enacting legislation similar to the Oklahoma plan. The governor of Nebraska is considering the advisability of calling a special session of the legislature on account of the growing belief among the people that protection to bank depositors in the form of state or federal guarantees of their deposits will stop the hoarding of money, bring into circulation sufficient currency to conduct the business of the country, and prevent a recurrence of such disastrous panics as the one through which we are now passing.

Mr. Bryan has been an advocate of a law guaranteeing deposits in state and national banks since 1893. The legislature of Ohio has adopted a joint resolution inviting Mr. Bryan to address its members in joint session February 18, 1908, on the subject of Guaranteed Bank Deposits.

Mr. Bryan, in discussing the tariff question, insists that residents of the United States should be permitted to buy home-made goods at home at as low a price as the foreigner can buy American made goods abroad. He also insists that our government should be by and for the people as a whole, rather than by and for the trusts, and administered in the interest of a few beneficiaries of the trust system. He believes that national legislation for the purpose of better regulation and control of interstate commerce and common carriers should supplement state legislation, and not be a substitute for state legislation.

(OFFICIAL) Proceedings of the Board of Aldermen of the City of Opelousas

Opelousas, La., Tuesday, Feb. 4, 1908. The Board of Aldermen met on the above date in regular session with the following members present: B. A. Littell, Mayor, presiding; Aldermen Lewis, Evans, Lawler, Roos and Ventre. Quorum present. Minutes as read, adopted.

Mr. Lawler offers the following ordinance which having been read section by section, was duly adopted:

AN ORDINANCE To authorize the Mayor to call for bids for the paving and curbing of sidewalks on certain streets within the corporate limits of the City of Opelousas, La., in accordance with the provisions of Section 2 of Act No. 147 of the General Assembly of Louisiana of the year 1902 and prescribing in what manner same shall be done.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Opelousas, La., that the Mayor of said city be, and he is hereby, authorized and empowered to advertise for sealed bids for the construction of sidewalks and curbing on the following streets in the City of Opelousas, La., in accordance with the provisions of Section 2 of Act No. 147 of the General Assembly of Louisiana of the year 1902, to-wit: On Union street, east side, from Groize street to join the sidewalk constructed by the Colorado Southern, New Orleans & Pacific Railroad Company at the depot site, east side, from Cheney street to Convent street.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., that said call for bids for the construction of said sidewalks shall be for first-class sidewalks as established by ordinance of the Board of Aldermen adopted Feb. 2, 1904, and in accordance with the plans and specifications on file in the Mayor's office of this city, copies of which shall be furnished each prospective bidder.

Section 3. Be it further ordained, etc., that said call for bids shall contain the reservation of the right of the Board of Aldermen to reject any and all bids.

Section 4. Be it further ordained, etc., that the entire cost of construction of said sidewalks shall be assessed against and paid by the owners of the abutting property.

Section 5. Be it further ordained, etc., that the provisions of Section 2 of Act No. 147 of the General Assembly of Louisiana of the year 1902, shall be assessed against and paid by the owners of the abutting property.

Section 6. Be it further ordained, etc., that all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith, be and the same are hereby repealed.

Section 7. Be it further ordained, etc., that for good and sufficient reasons, this ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage.
