## HOW TO REACH GROUNDS

### Ample Accommodations Have Been Secured.

## PATRONS OF STATE FAIR.

### Bureau of Information—Management Secures Rooms For Out of Town Visitors Who So Desire—All Railroads Will Put on Excursion Rates.

The management of the Louisiana State Fair, which will hold its fourth annual event at Shreveport, Nov. 1 to 6, has seen that nothing is overlooked for the comfort and accommodation of the out-of-town visitors and exhibitors.

Every railroad entering Shreveport has announced special excursion rates for the entire week, while on special days still lower rates will be in force for a shorter period. In this manner the out-of-town visitor will be afforded the opportunity of visiting the State Fair at a much less cost than otherwise.

The State Fair has announced that it will maintain two information bureaus while the Fair is in progress, one at its office at 213 Milam street and the other at the city hall.

Those in charge of the information bureau will be glad to afford the visitor any information desired in regard to the city, where he may get accommodation, how to get to the grounds, etc.

A complete list of those having rooms to rent will be kept on file, with the rates charged for single persons and large parties, and in this manner the visitors will be able to get clean and respectful quarters for a reasonable price.

The Shreveport Traction company will run its cars right to the Fair grounds, while the Missouri, Kansas and Texas will run special trains from the Union Station to the Fair grounds every twenty minutes. In this manner ample transportation facilities to the Fair grounds will be afforded the great crowds which are expected to fill the city each day of Fair week.

At the Fair grounds will be found restaurants and refreshment booths, where lunch and supper can be secured by those who desire to put both the day and evening in at the Fair grounds.

## MACHINERY HALL INTERESTING.

### Exhibits of All Kinds of Machinery is an Instructive Study at State Fair.

The machinery exhibits at the Louisiana State Fair, which will be held this year from Nov. 1 to 6, promises to be one of the most interesting and instructive features viewed by the agricultural visitor, and all others interested in the latest improved farming methods. The State Fair has a large building devoted exclusively to machinery exhibits. In addition to the regular hall space, the State Fair has a certain portion of its grounds set aside for outdoor machinery exhibits. Here the various portions of machinery are put in operation and the visitor is able to see how they are worked and just what tasks they can accomplish. Each exhibit is accompanied by experienced machinery men who not only take part in the demonstrations, but are glad to answer the questions of those interested and explain every part and detail of the work which can be accomplished by their particular exhibit.

The machinery exhibits are an educational feature to any one interested in the latest and most approved methods of farming and are a feature at the State Fair which no visitor should overlook seeing and giving close attention.

## SWINE BY THE HUNDRED.

### State Fair of Louisiana Building Additional Pens For Exhibits.

The State Fair of Louisiana is making arrangements for additional swine sheds for this year's hog show, which will be held with the State Fair at Shreveport from Nov. 1 to 6. L. E. Frost of Springfield, Ill., has kindly consented to judge the swine again this year, while George Epple of important department of the State Fair.

Louisiana swine are rapidly forging to the front and great sales were reported from the exhibits at the State Fair last year. The farmers of Louisiana are now going into hog raising more than ever before, and there is expected to be a still greater hog show than was the case last year. Mr. Frost is considered one of the greatest hog breeders in the country, and while judging the stock at the Louisiana Fair has proved of great assistance to the exhibitors, by suggesting on what lines to breed certain entries in order to get the best results. During the last State Fair the exhibitors held a mass meeting and presented the State Fair officials with a signed memorial asking that Mr. Frost be asked to judge again this year.

## STATE FAIR ENDORSED.

### Shreveport Merchants Offer Attractive Displays in Exposition Hall.

The State Fair of Louisiana, which will be held at Shreveport this year from Nov. 1 to 6, has not more loyal supporters than the enterprising merchants of Shreveport. Almost every business institution of the city has its own space in the Exposition hall, in which it places attractive displays, showing the class of goods it offers the consuming public.

At the same time the Shreveport merchants have a number of bargain days while the State Fair is in progress. Through a co-operative plan by the merchants those desiring to attend the State Fair and at the same time do some shopping, can get their expenses paid by the local merchants on the refunding plan, as outlined by the advertisements of the Shreveport Trade Extension association.
