JOYCE AND HIS STOMACH.
Among the members of the House Committee recently in this State was the Hon. C. H. Joyce, of Vermont, as true a specimen of the narrow-minded, bitter and obstinate partisan as ever New England sent abroad to experience the Pharisee's comfort, and, at the same time, prove to others that "house-keeping youth have ever homely wits."

He was sent down here, apparently, on a judicial mission, to make an impartial and unbiased inquiry, and we have no doubt his soul is quite easy as to the manner in which he discharged his duty. We would not intimate that he disregarded the dictates of his conscience in any respect, but doubtless his Vermont constituency have very decided convictions, and it would have been "hat burglary" to have robbed him by insidious testimony of the preconceived opinions which entitled him to represent them in Congress. To have changed these sentiments would have been to "throw himself away without sufficient cause."

Upon this advice Mr. Joyce acted, and with the most scrupulous and conscientious consistency. At Baton Rouge the testimony of Victor Lange and the other Republicans, to the peace and fairness of the election, fell upon deaf ears; while the indignant denunciations of old Mortimer Price, the old servant of Henry Clay, who was "still a bad Radical," whose pretty daughter had been debauched by Davis, the Parish Judge, who had been driven from the community for this very infamy, were treated with contempt. At Bayou Sara our Congressman contented himself with asking witnesses if Weber and Munchausen Kaufman, the man who had fought "twenty duels," were not "notoriously afraid" to come before the committee and testify. Kaufman forgot all about this understanding that he was terrorized and came into the committee room on one occasion, but being reminded of it, left in short order. At Clinton he brow-beat witnesses, and, under the protection of his position, assumed towards such gentlemen as Captain Norwood and Mr. Fuqua a swaggering insolence that he would not have dared to indulge under any other conceivable circumstances. This is a fair statement of the manner in which he went about flouting out the true inwardness of affairs in Louisiana. To any one cognizant of this behavior, it was not necessary that he should give any intimation that he should give any intimation...

Mr. Joyce was one of the sub-committee that was sent with Judge New to Baton Rouge and the Feliciana, which left New Orleans just before Christmas, and at the very beginning of that unprecedented spell of weather which lasted until late in January. He necessarily encountered many discomforts and had reason for complaint in some instances. But his complaints of the fare are simply amusing, and to one who saw him eat—and we had a "chiel" along "taking notes, and faith he'll prevent 'em"—they appear the basest ingratitude. To tell the meagre truth, "he was a man of an unbounded stomach."

But this stomach, like Launce's dog, was a most ungrateful and whimsical beast. It played him constantly all sorts of pranks, and could never be taken to table like other "gentleman-like" stomachs, but it betrayed its owner and forced the indignant query of Launce to his dog "Grab!" "Didn't thou ever see me do such a trick?" At Baton Rouge, while the other gentlemen of the party were feasting on woodcock and all manner of game, garnished with fresh mushrooms and other indigenous dainties, this beastly Vermont stomach was in one of its most unaccountable moods, and angrily rejected all other food but raw beef—literally raw, as it left the butcher's stall—and crackers. Such a stomach must necessarily submit its owner to many vicissitudes, and it is but natural that it should make of him one of

Do cream and mastic, like a stinging pond; but, we must be pardoned, a sly grin at the man who, bringing with him such a testimonial of New England cookery, should assume to pass upon the famous cuisine of Louisiana, and say our people house like herdsmen and feed like hogs. Mr. Joyce had his notions about good living, but they were Vermont notions, and very queer ones. His much-abused digestion may have occasionally assumed a healthier tone, but doubtless upon these rare occasions his eyes brightened and his mouth watered for ham and eggs and fried cabbage, and such like familiar grub. Woodcock and steaks had no charms for him, and mushrooms were but "tadustools."

Some time ago there appeared in one of the New York papers an article upon this very subject, in which the savage atrocities of New England cookery were dwelt upon with a bitterness that could have been inspired only by painful experience. The article was lost among our exchanges, and we could not now refer to it if we would, but we remember how our blood curdled with horror when we contemplated some of the dishes described. We never understood Joyce's case till we read that article. His idiosyncrasies were familiar to us, and we had even witnessed some of his notable "feeds;" we had seen him in his short intervals of convalescence bolting down great dishes of fried cabbage and lumpy pastry, but it was not until we learned upon what regimen his youth had been nurtured and his manhood had grown so great, that we were able to account for the wretched depravity of his tastes. But then the secret of his woes overcame us "like a summer's cloud, without our special wonder."


