SOUTHERN NEWS.

Louisiana.

Thieves are plentiful in Bieland. The Monroe Intelligencer reports great improvements in the cotton trade.

Covington has shipped just 742 bales of cotton this year. The Carnival at Pike's Hall, Baton Rouge, was a great success. There were plenty of tableaux and dancing.

A fire in Alexandria on last Saturday destroyed the engine house of that town, and other buildings and very nearly destroyed the town hall.

The Young's Point levee, in Madison parish, has finally been completed, and the people are happy in consequence, as the danger of overflow has been happily averted.

It takes New Orleans papers eleven days to reach Natchitoches, and as the telegraph is not in working order half the time, the people of that parish are just now enjoying last month's news.

Several citizens of Natchitoches who placed their names on the bond of the judicial sheriff of that parish, subsequently withdrew them, leaving the sheriff business and unable to qualify. He is still writing for securities to come forward and help him on.

The young men of Delta must be ungallant, since the Delta Sentinel has to lecture them thus: "It does not show much gallantry in the young men of Delta, to see young ladies promising these beautiful evenings without escorts. We hope, in this respect, to see an improvement in our young men. The ladies of Delta merit much more attention than they receive from the young gentlemen."

Approves of Judge Manning's decision that the Police Jurors of parishes have no right to assess taxes greater than 4 1/2 mills, the Opposer Courier charges that a greater tax than 4 1/2 has almost always been assessed in that parish for public purposes.

Mayor Dragout, the recently elected Mayor of Natchitoches, received his commission last Monday and took possession of his office without opposition. The ex-Mayor has become Parish Judge. As Mr. Dragout is a Democrat we need fear no more outrages in Natchitoches, such as took place there Christmas.

There seems to be some little disorder consequent on the election of the Mayor in Baton Rouge, but the Democratic officials of that parish are putting it down fast. A colored man named John Van Buren was recently shot in the cheek last Saturday by a white desperado. He made affidavit of this and a posse was at once organized by the sheriff and the offender pursued and promptly secured.

The Minden Democrat sums up the matter in this manner: "The man who pays a tax to any collector not holding a commission from Gov. Nichols, is paying money to support a fraud and an unwarper's government that is entitled to no recognition or respect from respectable citizens; nor is any individual, who pretends to act as an officer under a commission from P. Eckard, entitled to any consideration whatever."

Mississippi. The wheat prospects of Yazoo are reported promising. Navigation of the upper Tombigbee has just opened.

A new paper, the Southern Baptist, is published at McComb City and Atoka.

Not a single church in Ox or Oa has a regularly located pastor, a bad state of affairs, Italy.

Tehuila was visited by fire on the 5th inst. The whole business part of the town was destroyed. Loss, \$30,000.

The Western Union Telegraph Company has been sued for damages by the editor of the Median Mercury, for refusal to transmit a few days ago. From news to his papers. Damages claimed, \$10,000.

The Houston Telegraph, the oldest paper in Texas, has suspended temporarily, it says. A smoked ham weighing 112 pounds was exhibited in a store in Memphis a few days ago. The pig from which it had been cut weighed 110 pounds, and had been raised by a planter in Mississippi.

Mr. John M. Smylie has been appointed to the office of Commissioner of Swamp Lands, under so. of February 1, 1877. Mr. Smylie is thoroughly familiar with the status of those lands, which are located in the southern portion of the State and which we learn will be thrown upon the market after the 1st day of April.

The Pickwick Club and Waia's Benevolent Association, which celebrated Mardi Gras in New Orleans, presented the history of Moses in nine tableaux, the fluting of Moses; the burning bush; the ten plagues; Moses before Pharaoh; the slaying of the first born; the Egyptians urging Moses to depart; Moses striking the rock; receiving the law on Mount Sinai; the Brazen Serpent. The procession was seriously interfered with by the rain.

Very recently in Serbia a dozen people, white and colored, were suddenly seized with cholera morbus. Something so unusual created quite a panic. A general rush was made for doctors. After the sufferers were relieved they began to investigate the cause of the strange occurrence. Each of the afflicted families had a night some at the same place, and they naturally attributed the attacks of cholera morbus to this cause, from the supposed fact that stychnine had been given to the hogs, and through the medium of some found an introduction to their stomachs.






