The Nicholls wave is rolling onward

and recognized the Nicholls Govern-
ment. All the officials of that parish

Governor of the State.

them; they are the polecats of politics.
Their only hope is to disband or
carry out the plan of their leader,
Thornburg, and form an indecent
party of their own.

of Bayou Sara, parish of West Fel-
ciana, was held Monday, April 2. There
were no party nominations, no politics
at all in the election; candidates were
numerous and freely voted for. The

cer.

We must congratulate the citizens of
Bayou Sara on these officers and on the
unprecedented privilege granted them,
the first time for many years, of voting
for and electing their own officers.
They have seldom enjoyed this right
under Radical rule, as the Webers, who
ran the politics of the parish, forbid
and prevented all elections, and claimed
the privilege of naming the mayor,
councilmen and collectors; their candi-
dates being always appointed to these
offices by Kellogg, against the wish of
the citizens of the town.

PROCLAMATION

—BY—
FRANCIS T. NICHOLLS,
Governor of the State of Louisiana.

Whereas, it is provided by act No. 25 of the Ex-
tra Session of the General Assembly, approved
March 28, 1877, that an election shall be held on
the 30th day of April, 1877, by the qualified electors
of the parish of West Carroll, for a parish
judge, a clerk of the District Court, a sheriff,
a recorder, a coroner, five justices of the peace
and five police jurors from said parish at large;
Now, therefore, I, FRANCIS T. NICHOLLS,
Governor of the State of Louisiana, have
thought proper to issue this, my proclamation,
directing the Supervisor of Registration in and
for the parish of West Carroll, and the commis-
sioners of election and all other officers con-
cerned, to hold said election on the day above
mentioned with the view of electing the above
named officers, and that said election be con-
ducted and the returns thereof made in the
manner required by the constitution and laws
of this State.

In witness whereof, I have here-
unto signed my name and caused the
seal of the State to be affixed at the
city of New Orleans, this thirty-first
day of March, in the year of our Lord
one thousand eight hundred and
seventy-seven, and of the one hun-
dred and first year of the Independ-
ence of the United States of America.
