The colored people in Nashville, Tenn., have petitioned that the colored schools be placed solely in charge of colored teachers.

Three hundred thousand dollars worth of buildings are going up in Houston, and they talk of reconstructing the cotton mill.

Several escaped convicts are prowling about in Burleson county, and have on two or three occasions waylaid and robbed people passing along the roads.

The surveying and locating party of the Waco Tap extension of the Houston and Texas Central Railroad have reached Weatherford, and located the depot in that place; and it is expected that the cars will be running there by October or November next.
