A nice State in New Hampshire. At the late election thirteen constitutional amendments were voted for. All of these were adopted but two, to wit: an amendment striking the word "Protestant" from the bill of rights of the State and an amendment prohibiting removal from office for political reasons. Another amendment, abolishing the religious test as a qualification for office, by which all Catholics are excluded from holding office, got the slim majority of four.

We hear with the greatest satisfaction of the intention of Gov. Nichols to retain our esteemed friend, Mr. Ernest Miltenberger, in his present position of Judge of the Second Municipal Police Court. Under the new law just passed, regulating the several municipal police courts, Gov. Nichols will, at an early day, appoint the judges definitely. Mr. Ernest Miltenberger is a gentleman widely known in this community, and the firmness, fairness and justice with which he has thus far filled his position, is his best recommendation with Gov. Nichols for a continuance in office.

The Bee calls attention to a supposed error in the statement which appeared in Monday's EVENING DEMOCRAT relative to the amount which the July interest on the outstanding unconverted bonds and warrants would amount to. If the Bee will re-read our article it will notice that we avoided saying anything at all about the past due interest on these claims against the State, and confined ourselves to the statement of the amount which the half-yearly interest of July, 1877, would call for. The reason why we said nothing about this past due interest was that we had the assurance of a representative of some of the largest foreign holders of the unconverted Louisiana bonds that these creditors of the State would willingly forego their just claim for the past due interest thereon until such time as the finances of the State would allow of its payment without embarrassment or inconvenience.

With the departure, at 12 o'clock today, of the detachment of Federal troops stationed for some months past in the Orleans Hotel building, the curtain fell upon the last act of the horrid drama, military and political, which has convulsed this land for the last sixteen years. A new and bright era is dawning upon the country, and particularly upon the South; common sense and our material interests demand that we let the dead past bury its dead, and now, for the first time in many years, we are in a position to disengage ourselves from the ruinous conflicts induced by national party strife and to devote all of our energies to the recuperation of our wasted resources. The duty which confronts our government at this time is to destroy, as fast as possible, the last remaining vestiges of the odious carpet-bag reign which has desolated this State, and in this undertaking it will always have the ardent and unconditional support of the DEMOCRAT.

We find the following paragraph in yesterday's issue of the Times:
 The following appears also in the editorial paragraphs of the Pic of the 23d:
 "Wade Hampton has been married twice and is a widower. He had three children, two sons and a daughter. His eldest son, Preston Hampton, was killed at Gettysburg, and the second, Wade, Jr., lives in Washington county, Miss. His daughter Margaret is the wife of Col. John Haskell, of South Carolina."
 This paragraph first appeared in the Times of April 8, and has since gone the rounds of the country. We of course are pleased to furnish pleasant reading for the Pic, but we would like proper credit to be given.
 Now the paragraph which the Times earnestly claims and which it appears the Pic appropriated, and which "has gone the rounds of the country," is correct in one sole particular, which is that Wade Hampton has been married twice and is a widower. In every other particular the Times is in error. The following is a true and accurate

sketch of the South Carolina hero, of his ancestry and progeny:
 Gov. Wade Hampton is the son of Wade Hampton, Lieutenant Colonel and aid to Gen. Jackson in 1812 and 1815, and the grandson of Wade Hampton, of Revolutionary fame.
 Gov. Hampton was born in South Carolina, and is now about 59 years of age. He has been twice married. The first time to Miss Margaret Preston, who died in 1852, leaving four children, two sons and two daughters. One daughter, Margaret, died shortly after the death of her mother. The second son, Preston, was killed in October, 1864, on the lines below Petersburg, during the siege thereof. Wade, his eldest son, is now in Mississippi. His daughter Sally married John Haskell, of South Carolina. By his second wife, Miss McDuffee, the daughter of Gov. McDuffee, who died three years since, he has three children living, two sons and one daughter.

Very recently the Shreveport Times made a very savage attack upon Judge Boardman of the Caddo district, charging that for the purpose of dodging a recognition of either Packard or Gov. Nichols, he had outraged the bar and public sentiment in his rulings in a case of two prisoners in the Caddo jail, and for whom a Texas sheriff had a requisition from the Governor of that State upon Gov. Nichols. We were much surprised to learn that Judge Boardman had pursued a course so improper. However the Times was clear and positive in its statement, and we copied the article and accompanied it with some severe, but from the Times standpoint, just strictures. We were very glad yesterday to receive a letter from a prominent and highly esteemed member of the Shreveport bar, and an old time Democrat, assuring us that the Times had mistaken the decision of Judge Boardman, and that the article in that paper and the one in the DEMOCRAT, both did him great injustice. Our correspondent states that the decision of Judge Boardman, in the case in question, was entirely correct, and is sustained by the bar. We repeat that we are glad of an opportunity to make this correction, for though the Judge has sadly strayed from the straight and narrow path of politics he has been our long tried friend.
