She was accompanied by Dr. Isaac Cole, of Maryland, and sent up her card to President Hayes, who shortly afterward came into the East Room and received her. She told the President that when a little girl she saw Washington lay the corner stone of the Capitol. The President expressed himself gratified at meeting her, and hoped she would live to shake hands with other Presidents to come.
