

THE NEW ORLEANS REPUBLICAN AND DR. LAYTON.

Editor Democrat.—The Republican in its issue of May 16th, makes some comments on the sentence put by Dr. Layton on the lips of the German Chancellor: "Religious belief may be anything you please, as long as it is confined to the individual's mental faith; but his conduct must not be ruled by it. Whichever religion crosses the State, religion must give way; the laws of the land, whatever they may be, must be observed."

"This is American doctrine," says the writer in the Republican. Such an assertion cannot be answered seriously, because from such a doctrine the following consequences should be drawn; the prophet Daniel in the lion's den, the three children in the fiery furnace of Babylon, were great criminals, for they resisted a law of the land; they refused to obey a decree enacted by a powerful King, and promulgated with the greatest solemnity.

During three hundred years in the beginning of the Church thousands upon thousands of Christians died rather than betray the dictates of their conscience; they were great criminals, undoubtedly, since they dared to obey God rather than man. Many of their brethren committed the same crime now-a-days, not only in the heathen countries of Asia, but in more civilized spots of Europe. They prefer to undergo fines, exiles, and death itself, rather than obey human statutes opposed to the law of God.

It is supposed that the Republican has overlooked these plain conclusions drawn from his premises. He knows full well that human conscience is accountable to no civil tribunal; that it requires no argument—it is as clear as noon-day.

Seats have been provided for them as much as possible on the floor of the two houses, and the sight of so much style and beauty among them makes the old-time colorado legislator open his dull eyes in astonishment.

I beg to call your attention to the 9th section of Act No. 80, passed April 20th, 1877, reorganizing the Board of Health, as follows: SECTION 9. Be it further enacted, etc., That it shall be the duty of the attending Physician or Midwife, at the birth of any child in the parish of Orleans, to report the same to the office of the Board of Health within twenty-four hours of the same; and that he be the name of the father, or in his default, of any person present at the birth of any child, to report within twenty-four hours from the date of the birth, to the office of the Board of Health, such birth report shall be recorded in presence of two witnesses, and shall as nearly as possible show the date, hour, street and number of the house, the sex of the child and its name, the names of the father and mother, their occupations, age, race, complexion and residence, and the names of said witnesses.
I respectfully urge your co-operation in a matter of so much importance to science as that of the vital statistics of New Orleans.

CHARTER.

STATE OF LOUISIANA, PARISH OF ORLEANS—CITY OF NEW ORLEANS.

Be it known, that on this sixteenth day of April, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven, and of the independence of the United States of America the one hundred and first, before me, Edward Ivy, a Notary Public for the parish of Orleans, and city of New Orleans, State of Louisiana, duly commissioned and qualified, and in presence of the President, and the members of the undersigned, personally came and appeared the several parties whose names are hereunto subscribed, who declared that availing themselves of the provisions of the statutes of the State of Louisiana relative to the organization of corporations in this State, they have covenanted, agreed, and do by these presents covenant, agree and bind themselves and those whom they represent, and all such persons as may hereafter become associated with them, whether by purchase, transfer or otherwise, to form themselves into and constitute a corporation for the objects and purposes, and under the stipulations and regulations following to-wit:

ARTICLE FIRST.
The name and title of said corporation shall be "THE NEW ORLEANS WRECKING COMPANY," and its domicile is hereby established in the city of New Orleans, State of Louisiana. Citations in suits against the corporation may be served on the President, or, in his absence from the city, on the Secretary.

The corporation shall have power and authority to—
First—To have and to enjoy succession by its corporate name for the period of twenty-five years.
Second—To contract, sue and be sued in its corporate name.
Third—To make and use a corporate seal.
Fourth—To hold, receive, purchase and convey real and personal property, both real and personal.
Fifth—To name and appoint such managers, directors and officers as its interests and convenience may require; and
Sixth—To make and establish such by-laws for the purpose of management and regulation of the affairs of the corporation as may be necessary and proper.

ARTICLE SECOND.
The object of the corporation for which this corporation is established is the carrying on of a general wrecking business.
ARTICLE THIRD.
All the corporate powers of the company shall be exercised by a Board of Directors and such other officers as they may appoint, and all its business shall be managed by the President and the Board of Directors.

Said Board of Directors shall consist of five persons, any three of whom shall form a quorum for the transaction of business.
A Board of Directors shall be organized on the 1st day of December, 1877, and annually thereafter, from the stockholders, by ballot, each member of the company being entitled to as many votes as he may have shares subscribed and paid for, in accordance with the terms hereinafter named; the election to be held, each stockholder having the right to appoint a proxy in case of his absence, to cast his vote not only for the election of directors, but in all business matters to be had in the Board of Directors. In the event of no election being held, or if no one or more of the newspapers published in the city of New Orleans, shall, at the time and place fixed, call for an election to be held within ten days after the failure to do so, the Board of Directors shall be organized in one or more of the newspapers published in the city of New Orleans.

The Board of Directors shall, at its first meeting, elect a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary and a Treasurer, and such other officers as may be deemed necessary. The President shall hold office until the next annual meeting, and all his successors are duly elected, G. Andrews, M. Schwartz and H. Meader.

ARTICLE FOURTH.
The capital stock of this corporation is hereby fixed at the sum of one hundred thousand dollars, represented by two hundred and forty shares of fifty dollars each; the amount of each subscription shall be payable in cash at the signing of these presents.
ARTICLE FIFTH.
No stockholder in this corporation shall ever be liable or responsible for the contracts or debts of the corporation; nor shall any more information in organization have the effect of rendering this charter null or of exposing a stockholder to any liability beyond the amount of his stock.

ARTICLE SIXTH.
This charter may be amended, altered or changed, and the capital stock may be increased to any sum not exceeding fifty thousand dollars, or the company may be dissolved at a general meeting of the stockholders, called for that purpose, with the assent of three-fourths (in amount) of the stock represented at such meeting. Whenever the dissolution of the corporation shall become necessary by the action of the stockholders, by limitation of its charter, or from any cause whatever, its affairs shall be liquidated, placed in liquidation, under the charge and superintendence of three commissioners appointed by the Board of Directors, and who shall remain in office until the final liquidation of the affairs of the company, and the distribution of its surplus funds among the stockholders.

ARTICLE SEVENTH.
The names of the stockholders, their residences, and number of shares held by each are declared to be such as are subscribed to this act of incorporation, and set opposite each of their names respectively.
Thus done and passed in my office, at New Orleans aforesaid, in the presence of Thad. J. Clark and Jas. H. Tilden, Clerks of the Court, both of this city, who hereunto sign their names, with the parties and me, notary, on the day and date aforesaid.


