THE GREAT WAR.

The war in the East proceeds with great vigor and activity on both sides. Bessia has swept with great rapidity, and aroused the east coast of the Black Sea, storming Ardahan, and threatening Kars and Erzeroum.

Turkey is evidently sorely embarrassed how to check the progress of the Russians in the East, and defend the threatened points of passage of the Danube and man her fortified towns.

It is imagined that the Krupp guns of the Turkish ships will reach Odessa, and reduce it either to ruin or capitulation.

On the whole, the war, as it progresses, promises to be most destructive and sanguinary, and if not arrested by the intervention of the other powers, a prolonged one.

A somewhat notorious negro politician named Laws, was killed in Jackson, East Feliciana, on the 19th inst., by another negro, the paramour of his wife.

Col. Dan Wilson, we are very glad to learn, has been appointed passenger agent of the New Orleans, St. Louis and Chicago Railroad.

What snobbery, when it is seriously proposed to place the Prince of Wales at the head of the British army, in view of hostilities against Russia.

The New York Sun affirms that Morton will sustain the claim of Kellogg in the Senate against Judge Spafford, or anybody else.

The case of Kellogg will bring up the whole Louisiana question, and the whole conduct of the Administration. The greatest debate of the Senate may be expected in this subject.

We wish we could think differently; but we fear the Sun is right and that the American Senate is to be subjected to the fresh disgrace of some of its members making a powerful effort to exclude from his seat a man of honor and intellect.


