Louisiana. Houma has a new fire company. There is a great demand for laborers in Lafourche parish.

The Thibodaux Bridge Company have declared a dividend of eight per cent. The school board of Lafourche lately divided the parish into 27 school districts.

Hamp Keys, a member of the Legislature of '72, now peddles crabs in Thibodaux.

The stage line between Lake Charles and Orange, Texas, has been increased to a tri-weekly service.

Two of the newly elected trustees of New Iberia turn out to be disqualified, already holding other offices.

A man by the name of Marlborough had his hand cut off by a circular saw at Shaffer's plantation, in Bayou Chacaboula, parish of Lafourche.

Messrs. Courtrie, Sewall and Haskell, appointed by Judge Billings to appraise the logs seized in Calcasieu parish, arrived in Lake Charles last week.

They called upon the deputy marshals in charge of the logs to produce an inventory of them. This they were unable to do, having made no inventory.

The assessor was telegraphed to New Orleans, and the committee is waiting to see what to do.

John Smith was killed on the abandoned road, four miles from Shreveport, while he was taking supper with a Mr. Lovelace and family.

Mr. Bernheim had just finished his supper, and was seated near the window, when the assassin fired at him with buckshot, nine of the bullets entering his body.

Mr. Lovelace immediately pursued the assassin, but was unable to catch up with him. A man by the name of Prather is suspected of the murder.

Mississippi. The public schools of Leake county open next week.

The thermometer at Carthage last Monday stood at 34.

The Newton Bulletin suggests the Rev. Mr. Bardwell as Superintendent of Public Instruction.

Quite a number of hogs, cows and calves, bitten by a mad dog in Water Valley, have had the hydrophobia.

Discussing the question of negro participation in politics, the Vicksburg Herald says that, "while we are in favor of giving the negro every right secured him by the amendments to the constitution, we can't see that it is our business to take him up and ram politics down his throat."

At the recent meeting of the Mississippi Press Association, at Holly Springs, W. J. L. Holland, of the Holly Springs Reporter, was elected president, and C. E. Wright, of the Vicksburg Herald, and R. H. Henry, of the Brookhaven Ledger, vice presidents.

Vicksburg has been taking soundings in order to test the effect of the change in the river current since the cut-off opposite was formed, which shows that the river has shoaled fully six feet at Matthews' Mills, three at the elevator, and seven opposite the compress, etc.

Texas. The Bask penitentiary is to be finished by the fifth of next December, at a cost of \$160,000.

Sherman sent twenty white men, eight negroes and one woman, with her child, to the penitentiary.

The hail storm a week ago in Fannin county did some damage. Orchards in its line of passage were stripped of fruit, and corn and cotton badly damaged.

A barbecue was held at Kaufman on the fifth in the interest of the Sabine Pass and North Western railroad. Land donations were liberally subscribed to this end.

The A. L. Leno Mayor, in Austin, came to the city, and resulted in the election of DeGress, formerly Superintendent of the Public Instruction under Davis administration.

There were eight candidates in the field, and the radicals united on DeGress and ran him in.

The Comanche Chief says that in "Coleman and adjoining counties for months past a state of anarchy has reigned and life and property have been insecure. These counties have been made headquarters for thieves and murderers, who have concentrated there with such force as cannot be overcome by the law-abiding and law enforcing citizens."

A singular accident occurred near Palo Pinto last Saturday evening. A Mrs. Roller, whose husband lives at Mr. Humphrey's, on the river, was milking a cow her son, a man of 25 years, standing near with a stick three or four feet long in his left hand, the hand resting against the left groin.

While in this position the cow kicked, striking the end of the stick, and driving the opposite end against the lower part of Mr. R.'s abdomen, producing inguinal hernia, from the effects of which he died next evening.

Third section—All that portion of the city known as the Third District. Fourth section—All that portion of the city known as the Fourth District. Fifth section—All that portion of the city known as the Fifth District, or Algiers. Sixth section—All that portion of the city known as the Sixth District. Seventh section—All that portion of the city known as the Seventh District.

3. The contract for repairing and keeping in repair, for the term of two years, all of the shell and ballast roads of the city, to be sold in two sections. First section—All that portion of the city above the centre of Canal street, comprising the First, Fourth, Sixth and Seventh Districts. Second section—All that portion of the city below the centre of Canal street, comprising the Second and Third Districts. It is well understood that the contractors for any of the above contracts have nothing to do with repairing any of the streets or bridges that any of the city railroads are under contract to keep in repair.

4. The contract for repairing and keeping in repair and running the draining machines of the city for the term of two years, they to be sold as follows: First—The Dublin Avenue and Melpomene machines to comprise the first section, and to be sold together. Second—The Bienville machine to comprise the second section. Third—The London Avenue machine to comprise the third section.
