MORE REBELLION.

And now it is from that mysterious and remote corner of our vasty expanded territory, Sitka, that come the latest accounts of war, trouble and rebellion.

So long as the pay of the workman can be fixed according to a certain standard, that standard will continue to be the lowest at which an equilibrium can be established between his necessities and the gains of the capitalist who employs him.

"Wages," says Locke, "not only depend upon the relative amount of capital and population, but they cannot, under the rule of competition, be affected by anything else."

We have indicated how the number of these competitors may be diminished by the establishment of partnership relations with the whole indefinite fund of produced wealth.

THE LABOR PROBLEM.

The labor problem has been given a sensational interest by the recent riots, but beyond this these demonstrations have proven but one thing, and that is that the question demands a solution with an urgency that was not expected.

It is very certain that there can be no productive work, under the present industrial system, without capital; men who do not possess it must appeal for aid to those who do, and they are compelled to solicit this aid by the most exacting of all necessities—bread, clothing, shelter.

It is not in accord with the true principles of justice and right that the relations between labor and capital should be left to a compromise between self-interest and inexorable necessity.

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SECTIONAL MISTRUST.

The Republican State Conventions, and notably that of New Hampshire, recently held, whilst very guardedly indorsing the policy of the Administration, take occasion to instigate their doubts as to the fidelity of the South in the obligations assumed by the States of that section.

These partisans, accustomed to break their own engagements, now say that this is all very well if the South can be depended on, but if that section should hesitate, or depart therefrom, then the original policy of the Republican party: that of force, fraud and plunder, must be resumed and re-applied.

We shall claim and maintain our equal rights under the constitution, and deny and resent all attempts of our co-equals in the confederacy to impose on us any new and additional terms and conditions.


