England is about to imitate her Dutch neighbor by attempting to reclaim a large part of the shallow arm of the sea in North Lancashire known as Morecombe bay.

The San Francisco Call, commenting on the work of the Fish Commissioners, says it is now well understood that very few of the Eastern varieties of fish can thrive there. It thinks the best work of the commission has been in protecting and propagating the native varieties.

More than twenty-five years ago Macaulay said that when the American people chose they could make anarchy for themselves.

It requires forty per cent of the revenue of Trigg county, Ky., to pay the salaries of two officers—the county judge and the attorney—which prompts the people of that county to agitate for a reduction of salaries.

Realistic acting is appreciated in Gold Hill, Nev. John Crawford, a member of Buffalo Bill's dramatic troupe, shot himself in the leg while slaying stage Indians, and the admiring citizens have presented him with a gold badge.

A great cattle salesman lately told the most committee of the House of Commons that Spanish and Portuguese cattle are the healthiest and most valuable continental beasts that reach the English market.

White mustard was largely sown in France last autumn for fodder. It is so relished by milk cows that many peasants call it "the butter plant." It is sown in August, and the stubble, if the soil be friable, and harrowed in, or sometimes the soil is turned over with a plow, five pounds of seed to the acre. The plant can be consumed green till the frost arrives.

—Charleston, S. C., is engaged in boring an artesian well, the depth of which has reached 1377 feet, 1370 feet of piping has been inserted, and as fast as the depth is increased more piping will be inserted until a stratum is reached sufficiently hard to render piping unnecessary. One small head of water has been reached, but it was so small that it has been shut off.

—The London papers tell of a race from Dover to London between the Continental mail express train and a pigeon. The bird was tossed from a carriage window as the train left the Admiralty pier, and the train immediately got up a speed of sixty miles an hour, and proceeded without stopping to Cannon street. The pigeon, which was "homed" to a building in Cannon street, took the straight route, probably saving half a mile in the whole distance of 76 1/2 miles, and beat the train by twenty minutes, or a time allowance of eighteen miles.

—The Columbus (Ga.) Enquirer glows with patriotic and patronizing enthusiasm. "If Mr. Hayes feels that Washington is in danger," it exclaims, "let him call on the South. He can get forces here which will defy every attempt of the raiders and communists. The South will rally by thousands to the defense of the country, and the experiment of the mob at Pittsburg and Buffalo will hardly be attempted after one trial if a portion of her true sons are summoned to the defense of the capital."

—The last number of the Paris Droit contains five official notices of probity, the name and addresses of the honest folk thus commended being given in full. A workman had picked up a gold watch and handed it to a policeman, who managed to discover its owner and return it to him; a brakeman had acted similarly with a valuable gold medal; a photographer who found an \$80 bill had sought out the owner and returned it to him; a railway porter had turned over to the mail a \$1000 package of checks payable to order, and a house servant had restored a pocket-book containing \$3000 to its owner. In all these cases a reward was declined.

SOUTHERN NEWS.

Louisiana.

The cotton caterpillars reported in Avoyelles turn out to be only grass worms.

The weather in the country is quite moist, interfering to some extent with fodder pulling.

Crops in the rear portion of Tensas parish are not as promising as those on the river.

Nace Williams, on Gordon & Smith's place, West Feliciana, quarreled with his wife and filled her head with slugs. He has since left for other parts.

The bondsmen of James H. Stephens, the new colored postmaster of St. Francisville, are all white men, and Democrats. It was over this very office that the bloody shirt journals recently raised the cry of intolerance.

A number of negro boys charivari'd a friend in St. Joseph, Tensas parish. Not content with this, they marched around town, disturbing everybody's slumbers. The parish judge accordingly interfered and the ringleaders were looked up.

At Mr. Duncan's place, four miles below Covington, the army worms have made their advent, and are cleaning out sugar cane, cotton, and, indeed, all other green stuff, leaving no spire of grass or vestige of vegetation in their desolating march.

The assessor of St. Landry is greatly increasing the assessment of that parish. Formerly, property was assessed at a mere nominal value. Now it is at its true market value. Of course some complaints were made, but the complainants soon saw the sense and justice of this proceeding.

The schools in St. Landry cannot open, in consequence of the fact that the school board cannot compel Tom Anderson, treasurer of the late school board, to settle up. The Courier insists on a criminal prosecution or some proceeding to compel him to account for these funds.

There seems to be some trouble about the West Baton Rouge road law. Whether it does not suit the times or the people, no one seems to know. Certain it is, no one wants to accept the honorable position of road and bridge overseer, nearly every one of the commissions issued by the police jury having been returned to the president.

On Saturday night last, at about 9 o'clock, Alcide Mouton, a young mulatto, aged about 20 years, a laborer on the plantation of Mr. C. W. Hayward, at Big Cane, St. Landry parish, murdered his wife. The news spread like wildfire, and in a short time about a hundred blacks assembled, seized the murderer, and in the presence of some thirty whites, hung him to a tree a few hours after the perpetration of the murder. The sheriff left on Wednesday to arrest the prime movers in the hanging, and on Thursday night returned with some fifteen darkies, whom he lodged in jail.

One Newham, an ex-Radical of West Feliciana, has been making speeches in Donaldsonville, charging that "it is well known in West Feliciana that J. J. Barrow, sheriff of the parish, killed J. A. Weber there." While in West Feliciana Newham testified that he knew nothing of the matter, and Gov. Wickliffe swore that Barrow was in his office when the shots were fired.

The citizens of Red River Landing, Pointe Coupee parish, held a meeting July 20, at which disapprobation was expressed with the police jury, and a protest entered against any increase of salaries and the redistricting of the parish. A suggestion was made that a poll tax and a tax on dogs be levied for the benefit of the school fund. Gov. Nichols was requested to appoint J. L. Kingsbury to the vacant police jury office.

Yazoo proposes to have a grange fair soon.

The Adams county delegation is for Hamilton for Auditor.

Considerable hog stealing is going on at Pine Ridge, Adams county.

The Republican executive committee of Adams county met in Natchez Thursday morning and reorganized. They will put a ticket in the field.

Yalobusha county had her convention Saturday, and instructed for Thalhall for Governor, McCullum for Secretary of State, H. M. Street for Auditor, and C. M. Valden for Treasurer.

A few days ago, on the Holly plantation, in Franklin county, a negro named Alton Foster loudly threatened the life of Mr. Simpson Holly, when the latter took up his gun and shot the negro.

In the Wilkinson County Democratic Convention some debate arose whether delegates elected by colored voters should be entitled to seats. It was finally decided that they were proper delegates. A full county ticket was nominated.

The committee of engineers at Vicksburg have presented a supplemental report, in which they hold that the further caving of Delta Peninsula should be prevented at once. The committee also advises the citizens of Vicksburg not to depend solely upon government aid.

The Port Gibson Beville has found a bonanza. It says: "We have in our office a specimen of coal, found on the plantation of Hon. E. H. Stiles in this county, embedded several feet below the surface. It resembles in every particular the celebrated canal coal, and we learn that the State geologist is of the opinion that it will be found, on digging, in great abundance. We trust it may prove the forerunner of rich developments of coal, and scarcely any greater material blessing could be bestowed on us."

The stock meeting at Corpus Christi was a small one. The members will reconvene at San Antonio.

The farmers of Victoria are buying beaves for fattening, in order to dispose of their surplus corn.

The little daughter of Mrs. Mitchell was burned to death, at Overton last week, by the explosion of a coal oil lamp.

A line of hacks is soon to be run from San Antonio to the celebrated Santa Rosa Springs in Mexico. A round trip ticket will cost \$60.

The citizens of Sulphur Springs held an enthusiastic railroad meeting last week. They want the Jefferson Narrow Gauge road extended to their town.

HAYES INDORSED IN CINCINNATI. [Chicago Times.] CINCINNATI, July 26.—Delegates to the Republican State Convention were elected to-night, and the issue was the indorsement of Hayes' policy. That threw in the shade all questions of platform and candidates. The result is an

almost unanimous indorsement of the policy of conciliation. The most prominent man elected who will thrust a thorn in the flesh of the administration is Hon. Ben. Eggleston. The nomination of Judge Taft is now urged, in view of the nomination of R. M. Bishop, but Taft resolutely declines to consider such a proposition. He says he wants to make some money as a lawyer and cannot afford to be Governor. He does not say that he would not accept the office of Senator.

THE THOUSAND AND ONE.

All the Persons Employing Chinese Laborers in San Francisco Threatened. [St. Louis Republican.] SAN FRANCISCO, July 26.—The anti-occult meeting which had been called met early in the evening, near the new City hall. There was not a very large crowd, perhaps from five to eight hundred people. The speeches from the stand and the utterances of the crowd were of a most incendiary nature. Threats were openly made to clean out Chinatown and attack the residences of the railroad authorities, and from what could be learned by circulating among the crowd, it would appear that Friday evening had been fixed upon for a demonstration in that direction.

From some unaccountable cause neither the police nor vigilantes made an appearance at the meeting, which, after adjourning, formed a nucleus for a band which had been during the evening raiding in the southern portion of the city. During the evening men were detected distributing printed slips in envelopes marked

We have no new feature to notice in the Money market. Under the cover of the New York market and Foreign Exchange declined slightly, but the movement in both was limited. New York eight advanced 1-16 per cent for commercial. Stocks continue quiet. State Consols were quoted at 107 1/2; security line @112 1/2; collateral loan @111; at mortgages 8 1/2 @110, and second grade @110 1/2.

Gold opened at 105 1/2 @105 1/2, against 105 1/2 at New York, and after limited business, closed at 105 1/2; security line @112 1/2; collateral loan @111; at mortgages 8 1/2 @110, and second grade @110 1/2.

Foreign Exchange was easier. The only sales reported were \$1000 ten days' A1 clear sterling sight at 50 1/2; \$1500 bank at 51 1/2; \$1000 do sight at 51 1/2.
