

AFTER THE SOUTH CAROLINA SCALAWAG.

[Chicago Times.] COLUMBIA, S. C., July 26.—A. O. Jones, a mulatto, the former clerk of the House of Representatives, was brought from Charleston to-day in the custody of a detective. Immediately upon his arrival he was arraigned before Justice Marshall upon a charge of participating in the offenses charged against Moses and Lee, who were committed to jail yesterday, and also defrauding the State of \$32,250.70, as clerk of the House, in favor of the Republican Printing Company, of which he was a member. He was given until 8 o'clock p. m. to obtain bail in the sum of \$10,000 in the first case, and \$25,000 in the last. The hour arriving and no bondsman appearing he was committed to jail. Montgomery, the ex-speaker pro tem, of the Senate, was also committed to jail in default of \$5000 bail, upon a similar charge. These are noted scalawags of both races. It is generally believed that Moses, the ex-Governor, will give away, to use a radical slogan phrase, all of his former property in a rascally, not excepting ex-Gov. Chamberlain, who was attorney general during his administration. The whole of the gang of thieves will undoubtedly be brought to law before the committee are through. The arrest of Moses is regarded as the most important made yet, and the old saying that the biggest rascal is the first to turn State's evidence will hold good in this case.

PINCH AND BRUCE.

Pinchback, of Louisiana, and Bruce, of Mississippi, have at last struck the right place. They have traveled from Washington to San Francisco in search of a community which would appreciate them, but it was not till they reached Atchison, Kan., on their return trip, that they found the spot. They were met at the station by an escort, and were visited by the genius of the Champion. The latter person does not note the full justice for the first time. He says Mr. Bruce is the "come of politeness and affability," whose dress is a "paragon of neatness and taste," whose "diamond shirt studs are of the first water, and are large, brilliant stones," and who "appeared in a costly black dress suit that fits him exquisitely." As for Pinchback, he is a "smaller man, but if he lacks in physical proportion, he excels in mental attraction," and is "neatly and tastefully dressed in a well-fitting suit of gray cassimeres, cut in the latest style, and set his trim figure handsomely." This is delightful, but it is sad to notice that Pinchback has no diamonds of the first or any other water. It is no wonder that this gorgeously attired the noble pair were enabled to deliver speeches full of personal reminiscences and bristling with exalted statesmanship.

WHO IS RESPONSIBLE FOR THE PITTSBURG RIOT.

The Pittsburg papers are searching for scapegoats. The sheriff, for instance, ought not to have telegraphed to Harrisburg for troops, but should have summoned representative citizens to his aid. The Mayor, too, ought to have taken council with the sheriff, and proceeded in person at the head of a large force to the scene of action. The military authorities ought not to have massed the troops in the face of a curious and excited crowd. The soldiers, finally, ought not to have fired scattering volleys upon a terror-stricken crowd of spectators. The reign of terror, in a word was the result of a series of unpardonable blunders on the part of the county, city and militia officers, for the strikers were comparatively orderly, and contented themselves with obstructing tracks and stopping locomotives until the authorities provoked them to wrath. The local critics denounce everybody except the rioters and the citizen soldiers who allowed them to have their own way.

THE POPE'S HEALTH.

L'Italia, of July 31, says that there was held that morning a council of surgeons to discuss the condition of the Pope's health. Their illustrious patient, while relatively well, needs their attention, since the weakness of his legs is increasing, and there has been noted a swelling which has given rise to some uneasiness. The doctors agreed that the Pope should try a course of mineral baths and a change of air, but he positively refused the suggestion, so that some other treatment must be resorted to. In spite of the condition of his health the Pope retains all his wonted clearness of mind, although he is frequently seized with a desire for sleep strange to him, as he has always been a light and a brief sleeper.

THE FOOD STRIKE OF NORTHERN CITIES.

The bearing of the strike upon the food question is a subject receiving attention in the East. In New York the regular meat supply has been seriously interfered with. The dealers say they are short 2500 head of cattle every day, and beef has gone up \$1.50 per hundred. Poor cattle are now sold 3 or 4 cents a pound higher than a few days ago. In Philadelphia and Pittsburg the same state of affairs exists.

A Compliment to the Kuklux.

The South, of which lies have predicated lawlessness for ten years past, is at this time conspicuously exceptional for the aid it does not ask of the Federal government, and for the solicitation it does not make of Federal interference. Pennsylvania, West Virginia, Maryland, Ohio and Indiana are marked by lawlessness which was reported, though falsely, to be so characteristic of the South that other sections were supposed by their better civilization to be superior to it. The striker in the concrete is found to be a reality, while the kuklux in the general is as mild as a lamb, and is perfectly willing to earn his living at any rate—industrious having become a guest in the South since the dragon became a stranger and the carpet-bagger an exile.

A Threatened Strike of the London Police.

The latest foreign mail brings tidings of a threatened revolt of the London city police. They presented a petition to Col. Fraser, the Chief Commissioner, drawing his attention to the arbitrary character of the rule which compels all the members of the city force to reside within the city boundaries, and praying him, so far as married constables were concerned, to permit them to reside in the Metropolitan area. Further, it was pointed out that the almost daily demolition of house property in the city rendered it impossible to obtain adequate accommodation, while the rise in the rents puts them entirely beyond the

reach of the men. To this request the Commissioner replied, "that the wives and families of the married officers might reside wherever they choose, but in the event of their removing, the husband must reside in the single men's quarters at the various police stations in the city." The police at once decided to draw up a memorial to the Board of Aldermen, rehearsing their grievances under the following heads: Inadequate pay, the impossibility of obtaining accommodation consistent with the laws of decency and the due separation of the sexes, compulsory superannuation and supervision of the funds, the unfairness of the present system of promotion, and the right of direct appeal to the Police Committee. If the Aldermen will not redress their wrongs, they threaten to order a general strike of the city police. The police of the outlying Metropolitan district are in sympathy with them.

The Poles.

Capt. Amersley Symmes, the advocate of the theory that a navigable cavity extends through the earth from pole to pole, has contributed \$500 toward the Howgate Arctic expedition. Symmes says that all the results of the previous expeditions justify his belief, and he is confident that Howgate will be able to enter the cavity. In a letter to the Courier Journal, he says: "Did not Capt. Waiddell go upon a south exploring expedition a few years ago, and found an open Polar sea, as in the north, and when entering it found his compass had reversed its position, and was pointing north, when he thought he was going southward, and became alarmed and turned back, when, if he had followed on, as his compass directed he would have come out at the north pole, and would have proved the theory true, which says the earth is hollow, and, no doubt, habitable within."

Shark Fishing.

Two or three men and various dogs having been devoured by sharks of Melbourne, Australia, the government offered a reward for the capture of these fish, and three thousand were caught in one week; but, insasmuch the reward was only for one shilling a foot, and no reward is given for sharks under two feet, the fishermen threw the "babies" into the sea until they grow worth catching. Some men have been making from \$15 to \$20 a day by shark fishing.
