THREE CAR LOADS OF SILVER.

Something the Thieves Overlooked When Pilling the Railroad.
Among the cars which were destroyed by the fire of Saturday night and Sunday, during the prevalence of the riot, were ten or twelve which contained freight shipped by the Pennsylvania Lead Company of Mansfield. It was generally supposed that all of these cars contained pigs of lead, and amid the surf of the more valuable and more easily transported goods, no one thought of piling himself with this heavy metal. On Tuesday, after the fire, it was discovered that three of the cars contained pure silver, which had been smelted at the lamplite establishment, and which was on its way to the Philadelphia mint. The silver was in the form of a little smaller than pigs of lead, and like the lead, it was melted and run down between the ties and in the interstices. Of course there was no effort (part of the company to dissipate the impression that the cars contained silver but lead.
