

SENATOR McDONALD'S VIEWS.

(N. Y. World.) Senator McDonald, of Indiana, thinks the labor question will cut a big figure in the elections and no doubt be forced upon Congress. The general government, he thinks, should exercise a general supervision over the through traffic on railroads, somewhat analogous to the Federal police power over navigable rivers. Blaine and Morton, he thinks, are running a race to see which will be the champion of "the solid North." The President's policy suits him well enough, and though the presidential question will not be reopened, it is probable that the methods in which Louisiana was carried for Hayes will be investigated and put upon record.

THE SOUTH CAROLINA MILITIA.

Adjutant General Moise, of South Carolina, says: "About one hundred companies have been organized under the act of June 8, 1877, having an effective membership of about six thousand men, divided as follows: three thousand mounted rifles, cavalry, two thousand six hundred infantry, and four hundred artillery. All of these cannot be armed and equipped this year. Every effort is being made in that direction, and it is hoped that by extraordinary exertions two-thirds of these commands will be placed in a condition of efficiency ere the meeting of the Legislature."
