

INSURANCE NEWS.

The Imperial and Northern, of London, have recently paid about \$1,000,000 of losses through the recent great fire at St. John, N. B., and yet their representatives are happy, and let no care come nigh, probably remembering that "care killed a cat."

Down here we can comfortably wonder how the good people of the "strickers" district will feel when they come to fully realize that where their mobs (they did have mobs, really,) actually destroyed, or were the proximate cause of the destruction of property by fire, the said property is not covered by insurance. And yet we are not happy.

Insurances men generally report business in their line dull, as it is in all others; little or nothing doing in the placing of new risks; and a tendency to cut down amounts now carried, where practicable and safe, being the main feature of the business at present. On the other hand we find them not severely unhappy, but taking things easily; waiting patiently for the good time coming, when the general fall trade opens, and looking forward to a fat premium account before the close of the year.

It is said that the entire assets of the Maritime Mutual Insurance Company of St. John have been swept away by the burning of that city. Its books of accounts and papers have all been destroyed, and the loss in assets is placed at \$50,000. The company coolly recommends its policy-holders to insure elsewhere. (Insurance Herald.)

Commenting on which, the Cincinnati Enquirer says: Well, what of it? It was merely a "mutual" matter, and as the "policy-holders" were their own insurers, "on the mutual plan," and therefore constituted the "company," if they recommend themselves "to insure elsewhere" who should object?

Who, indeed, as long as they remain satisfied?

The Mutual Life of New York recently replied as follows to inquiries concerning the interests of certain policy holders: When our policy holders are duly called to act as citizen soldiers, or as citizens, in suppressing riots, or in vindicating the laws of the land, and maintaining its institutions, they are deemed by us as doing their duty only, and their claims on the company are held inviolate.

Such views and such expressions, made by life insurance men generally, would go far to allay the panicky feeling in regard to this great interest, developed by the events of the past year; and to restore that confidence, which should never have been lost, any more than all merchants should be suspected, because one, two, or half a dozen prove to be dishonest.

Mr. Commissioner Smyth, of New York, gave us a fine specimen of the beauties of State supervision when he revoked the authority of the Royal Canadian to do business in that State in consequence of its losses at St. John, N. B. Before he had made any examination of the company, its management had voted an assessment upon its large subscribed capital to meet the emergency, and was working rapidly, vigorously and successfully toward the betterment of its condition. Again, their risks in the United States are a first lien upon their assets in the United States; but this fact Mr. Commissioner Smyth seems to have utterly ignored, and so hurried on to make himself and his department utterly ridiculous by doing that which plain common sense should have told him he must almost immediately undo. Meanwhile the Royal Canadian must manifestly suffer a damage by his action. Who pays?

Still Ignorant "Continental" Tastes. J. P. Rogers, ex-secretary of the defunct Continental Life, of New York, wrote to his agents when the troubles of the company first became public: "Keep cool and hold on." He now justifies, in his own peculiar way, his advice at that time by "keeping cool" in a "continental" home in Belgium, which he manages to make not bare of comfort by means of his stealings from the defunct policy-holders of his late company, to which he has "hold on."

State Supervision. Had all the ingenuity of the legislators of the various States in which "Insurance Departments" exist, been joined to malicious hatred towards all insurance interests, they could scarcely have conceived a machine from which would have come more mischief to those interests than has resulted from the much vaunted system (?) of State supervision. Who that is familiar with the insurance history of the past twelve months can say that it has subserved the cause for which it is said to have been designed? Has it afforded protection to policy holders? Ask those who insured—Heaven save the mark!—in the Continental, of New York, how they appreciate such protection. Has it protected good companies? Ask those companies who should have had the new business done by that institution in 1876, how they like it. In cases like those of the Continental, Security and New Jersey Mutual it has simply served as a cloak to hide their rascality while they fattened on the misfortunes of their plundered victims. And when under this supervision, such companies pursue their way to ruin, while their officers enrich themselves at the expense of swindled policy-holders, until there is no longer any hope for salvation, and the crash comes, who suffers thereby? State Supervisors! Oh! no. State Supervision exalteth her horn and saith, "behold what I have discovered, and be thankful unto me that it has continued no longer," while the people who have insured (?) and find that they are gouged, turn on insurance men (who are sufferers with them) and proclaim that they are all a set of swindlers, forgetting that the Insurance Department had assured them that their companies were O. K., upon which assurance they had built their former happiness. The recent attempt to "wreck" the Charter Oak, was another and a shining example of the beauties of supervision. Some, seeing these things, have called for a radical reform. Let them learn that the only radical reform is abolition. Either abolish it, or supervise all alike, the merchant, banker, manufacturer, lawyer, doctor, etc., etc.
