As the 14th of September approaches we note with more gratification than we can express the preparations that are being made to appropriately observe that day of sacred and heroic memories, and to commemorate the patriotic devotion of the gallant men who made the day immortal.

This is not a question into which any considerations of policy can enter. The day we would suggest such is capable of denying the mother that bore him, or of any other depravity that betrayal and treachery may compass.

But we cannot conceive how such suggestions can have any weight. The day we propose to commemorate is the memorial day of the first blow that was struck against that system of military espionage and armed Federal supremacy which Grant inaugurated.

Let all organizations of our citizens, then, both civic and military, join together in a pagan worthy of the day and its historic deeds. That vindication which success brings has been won in the altered policy of the Federal government, and by that criterion we make this appeal.

RED RIVER NAVIGATION AND THE NEW ORLEANS PACIFIC.

So far from any conflict between the two propositions of improving the navigation of Red River and completing the New Orleans Pacific Railroad, they will and ought to move in entire harmony.

If, by a proper application of the resources of the Government and the State, and of the people, Red River can be made as useful as it has been in the past, the small sum required therefor should not be withheld.

than the railroad they should have every encouragement and aid from the people in doing so. 'Competition is liberty; monopoly is death.'

It is on this principle and policy that the president of the Red River Transportation Company—a company which owns nearly all the carriers employed on that river—comes forward among the first of the subscribers to the stock and bond subscription of the New Orleans Pacific.

It is a very narrow mind which can perceive any conflict between the two propositions to improve the navigation of Red River and to push forward the railroad, which will render our city independent of all the interruptions that may arise to the free use of the river as a vehicle of transportation.

Yesterday evening the members of the Press and other friends of the Bee, together with the proprietors and employees of that journal, met at the office of that paper to celebrate the fiftieth anniversary of its birth.

Thus we drifted on a sea of doubt and uncertainty until late in December, when the prospect for local self-government began to brighten. At that time State Consols were quoted on the market at 49 3/4 @ 50 1/4.

Several of these particulars strike us as strange. We had an idea that local self-government was inaugurated here with Gov. Nicholls, January 8, 1877.

Of course little mistakes like this on the part of the Times in dates, facts in Louisiana's history, etc., scarcely deserve notice, and we would not think of noticing them had they appeared in the editorial columns of that paper.

The necessity for establishing in this city a central office for vaccinating directly from the cow is felt and admitted by all, in order to reach the ravages made by the small-pox on our population.
