

INSURANCE NEWS.

We demand safety for those who must use lamps; 150 degrees fire test will give it. The Amazon Insurance Company, of Cincinnati, has reduced its capital from \$500,000 to \$300,000.

Providence, R. I., placed the building and pumping engines which cost her \$250,000 over a bed of quicksand, and they are now useless.

State supervision and amalgamations have fattened many frauds and robbed thousands of policy holders; but we look in vain for any compensating good accomplished thereby.

Refuse to buy any but high-test, non-explosive oils; take no other; you will pay a few cents more per gallon, but your oil will burn longer and give you better light; besides you will have secured safety.

Incendiary fires have never been so numerous in all parts of the country, as during the past few weeks, and they are the cause of much uneasiness in fire insurance circles. It is believed that the socialistic feeling prevalent among the workmen is responsible for many of the fires.

The Canada Insurance report shows: Canadian companies (13)—Premium income, \$1,881,641; losses paid, \$1,509,048; per cent of premiums paid in losses, 84.98.

British companies (13)—Premium income, \$1,597,410; losses paid, \$1,168,858; per cent of premiums paid in losses, 73.17.

American companies (3)—Premium income, \$228,955; losses paid, \$99,389; per cent of premiums paid in losses, 43.41.

Total of 29 companies—Premium income, \$3,708,006; losses paid, \$2,867,295.

The per cent of total premiums received paid for losses being 77.33, the highest since 1870.

From the Chronicle, we extract as to fire insurance rates as follows: That the present condition and future prospects of the fire insurance business in this country call for the immediate and serious attention of officers and managers of fire insurance companies, no one who is acquainted with the reckless manner in which the business in many instances is now being conducted will dispute.

After the Boston fire, and in the presence of the disastrous results that had attended it, most of the surviving companies realized the necessity of adopting paying rates. But when the business became fairly remunerative, owing to increased rates and the absence of large conflagrations, the greedy demon of a rivalry devoid of reason, sprang into existence between the companies. The effect of this rivalry has been manifested in the reduction of rates until a point has been reached, nearly forty per cent below that at which rates were fixed prior to the Chicago fire.

Unless the underwriting system which is now in operation be abandoned, the existence of the companies who continue to practice it must necessarily be of brief duration.

The companies who, like individuals, fail to learn by experience, and prepare for the evil day, taking into consideration not only the probabilities but the possibilities of events, cannot escape the consequences of such imprudence.

When officers of fire insurance companies who violate their trusts, and defraud their policy holders, are brought to swift and severe punishment; and when men who assume the duties of commissioners of insurance are made to promptly pay the penalty of incompetency or corruption, or both; confidence will be restored and business will increase; for the people want safe, legitimate insurance, and will buy it, when sure that they will get that for which they pay.

But so long as men ignorant of the principles and workings of insurance are made superintendents of that business, by reason of political affiliations and influence; and so long as unprincipled officers are, by reason of the ignorance, or corrupt co-operation of commissioners, allowed to pursue in peace their nefarious work until the catastrophe is at hand and may not be averted; and then are permitted to escape all reckoning by delay after delay, secured through the ineffectuality or complicity of public prosecutors, who fail or neglect to bring them to trial after indictment, dis-trust will prevail and business languish. See cases of officers of the Security Life, Continental Life, etc. All fire insurance men are interested in this matter, and will be to a certain extent judged by the outcome. Can they bring no influence to bear to secure the execution of the law, and procure the punishment of the guilty?

What is said in a Philadelphia Paper About Alphabetical Jewett's Threats. [Philadelphia Times.]

The threat made at Cincinnati by Jewett, the Secretary of the Louisiana Republican State Central Committee, that in certain emergencies he would expel from the State any Republican who carried by donating the returns of supervisors, contains a good deal more than appears on the surface, and some of the circumstances at least are known to several persons. After the election the supervisors of West Feliciana carried their returns without protest, each ridiculing the idea of protesting on account of intimidation. The Democratic majority in East Feliciana was 1743 votes, as cast in the regular boxes, and over 400 cast in other boxes by men deprived of registration owing to the absence of the supervisor. This brought the Democratic majority up to some 2200. In West Feliciana it was about 630. When it was found that Jewett's opinion depended on the State all the power of the Republican chiefs was brought to bear on these two supervisors, as the State could not by any means have been carried for Hayes unless their parishes were thrown out.

The fact that there were no Republican votes cast in East Feliciana makes a good case on the face for the Republicans. The supervisor of West Feliciana made a protest after the time required by law. The supervisor of East Feliciana made a general statement of affairs as they had been reported. He refused to swear to this report because it was mere hearsay, and he did not know that it was true. This was afterward changed to a regular intimidation protest, a jurat attached and the parties thereon reported. The closing chapter of this transaction is a curious one. The supervisor of West Feliciana held possession of this letter. He was shot down in cold blood after the inauguration and the letter mysteriously disappeared. The supervisor of East Feliciana left the State. Let Jewett speak, by all means.
