

INSURANCE NEWS.

But little stirring in insurance circles; business light. Low-priced coal oils and low test oils are apt to be one and the same thing; beware of them.

At ordinary temperatures gasoline and naphtha are continually giving off inflammable vapor, and a lighted match, or lamp, at some distance from the material itself, will ignite it through the medium of the vapor.

There were twenty-four vessels either belonging to or bound to or from American ports destroyed during July. The vessels destroyed included five barks, four briggs and fifteen schooners, valued, exclusive of cargoes, at \$220,000. No steamers or ships were lost.

Parker G. Smith, of New Haven, used coal oil and evidently did not take care to supply himself with oil of a good quality. Result, "a large kerosene lamp burst, with a loud report, about ten minutes before it would have been lighted." Do we not need laws prescribing fire tests which will prevent the sale of such stuff?

Insurance supervision seems to be taking a long vacation herabouts. A single life company is said to be undergoing examination, when at least half a dozen should be in process of probing. Nothing whatever is being done, so far as we are aware, in the way of looking after fire companies. Some fine day we shall hear of a collapse or two, and then there will be the usual inquiry as to whether protection protectors or State supervision supervisors. They are founded upon no principle which will or can stand fire; they operate unjustly in regard to payments required of the younger members of their respective classes; their calculations are based upon false assumptions of mortality; they afford greater and more numerous opportunities for fraudulent practices than any other scheme ever projected, with less chance of detection; and, after all, your protection, called, depends entirely upon the degree of patience with which you and your fellow members submit to the annually increasing assessments, and with each member who "lapses" your protection, even such as it is, is lessened. Beware of the co-operative.

THE PENNSYLVANIA WORKINGMEN. The Prospects of the Present Campaign in Pennsylvania. [N. Y. Tribune.] The Workingmen's movement is a troublesome factor in the politics of the present year. No one can tell what it is likely to amount to, or which party it will damage the more. In the anthracite coal regions it will draw its recruits chiefly from the Democrats; in Philadelphia among the operatives, and in Pittsburgh and vicinity, where many iron-workers are Republicans, it will hurt that party seriously. Take the State through, if the movement gathers much force, I should say that the Republican party will be the chief sufferer. Democrats are working into a passion against a President who is thought by so many of its members, to be carrying out their ideas.

The weakness of the Democratic position in Pennsylvania lies in the want of State issues, and in the absence of exciting national questions. Multitudes of good Democrats like President Hayes, and think he is doing better than Tilden would have done. After all, the result will depend, as in 1875 and 1876, upon the way Ohio votes. Since the date of the Pennsylvania election was altered from October to November, the character of campaigns here has undergone a complete change. They are no longer brisk and exciting. Money and stump-speaking do not, as of old, pour in from other States. Everything waits on Ohio, and both parties stake their hopes on the issue of the contest over the Western border. So it is this year. If Ohio is carried by the Republicans, the whole of Don Cameron's ticket will go through swimmingly. If it goes Democratic it will be hard work to save Judge Sterrett, and the other two candidates will probably be beaten. I see no reason why anybody should tear his hair if defeat overtakes his party. The Republicans ought to win as a rebuke to the demagogism of the Democrats on the labor question, and to their unbecomingly perfidy and meanness in regard to the verdict of the electoral tribunal.
