

INSURANCE NEWS.

Remember that only in a high-test oil can safety be found. If you still doubt, read the record below of New York and Brooklyn fires.

Milwaukee, Wis., reports fourteen alarms and ten fires in August, with losses amounting to \$22,945, of which \$845 was on buildings, and \$14,100 on stock and furniture. Causes of fires and amount of insurance not given.

Brooklyn, N. Y., reported in June last a total of thirty-two fires, with \$10,355 of loss and \$28,000 of insurance. Of these fires ten were caused by the explosion of coal oil lamps, and one by the upsetting of a coal oil stove, or over thirty-three per cent of the total number.

The Brooklyn August fire report shows a total of thirty-five fires; of these four were caused by bursting of coal oil lamps and one by explosion of a coal oil stove—i. e., fourteen per cent of the total. Losses and insurance as follows:

In New York city there occurred during the quarter ending June 30, three hundred and seventy-six fires, occasioning losses of \$7,740 on buildings, and \$152,908 on stocks, of which \$615 on buildings and \$16,410 on stocks was uninsured. Of these fires, thirty-eight or more than ten per cent originated from explosions of coal oil lamps.

The other night a woman out on South Hill was sewing in her room, when she was somewhat annoyed to see the apartment suddenly filled with non-explosive kerosene oil. She felt that she had occasion to go out into the air, and as the evening was cool, she wrapped a window sash around her delicate form and strolled through the front fence, usually remarking to a neighbor who was passing, "Fire." The remark attracted his attention, and in the course of the evening he repeated it to several of his neighbors and acquaintances, and their curiosity led them to visit the woman's house and pour 500 gallons of water on the best carpets and furniture. The place is now illuminated nightly with tallow candles. [Burlington Hawkeye.]

From the Wisconsin insurance report we gather that there are 139 fire and marine companies doing business in that State, against 133 at time of last report; 13 having discontinued business and 19 been admitted to the State during the year. There are 9 Wisconsin companies, 5 of which are mutuals. The fire business of the State for the past three years foots up as follows:
