THE MEETING OF THE EMPERORS.

An Alliance Between Servia, Roumania and Greece. (N. Y. Times.)

The results of the interview of Iechi still continue to be the great question of interest, and it is semi-officially declared that not only will Austria withdraw her objections to the offensive partition of Roumania in the way that the Servia is at liberty to attack the Porte whenever she pleases, provided the Bosnian and Herzegovinian insurgents receive no assistance, and that the military operations be limited to the direction of the eastern and southern frontiers—that is, to the Timok and Morava valleys.

The average price of fresh flour being this day seven dollars and fifty cents, in accordance with said valuation the price of bread for the week commencing on MONDAY, September 10, 1877, will be:

Thirty ounces for twenty cents. Sixty ounces for forty cents. Bakers of bread are required to use only the best flour of the above value per barrel, and the use of damaged or inferior flour in bread offered for sale in this city is prohibited.

Consumers of bread are requested to report to the nearest police station any violation of the above ordinance, either in violation of weight or quality of material.
