

THE WEATHER AND CROPS.

Red River estimates its loss of cotton at one-third the whole crop. The cotton crop of De Ho is cut down fifty per cent by the worms. The weather in Concordia is very contradictory—wet and dry, hot and cold, and bad for crops. The cotton crop of Lincoln will be slightly short, owing to worms. The bottom bolls of the cotton in Madison are rotting from the high growth of the weeds. The Franklin Sun reduces the estimate of the cotton crop of that parish from three-fourths to one-half a crop. Rainy weather did it. The cotton of Vernon is completely eaten up by the worms. Only a third of a crop will be made. A severe drouth has injured the potato, rice and cane crops. The general opinion in Concordia is that the planters of that parish will make as much cotton as they can possibly pick, notwithstanding the worms. The Lake Charles Echo says the cotton crop in Calcasieu parish will fall short two-thirds, owing to the ravages of the caterpillars. The worms have done considerable damage to the young cotton on most of the farms in the neighborhood of Wild Cow and Cynthia bayous, in Concordia parish. The old cotton has not yet been visited by the worms. The Alexandria Democrat says that up to August 10th the cotton crop of Rapides was the most promising it had seen since the war. Since that time it has contended with the serious drawbacks of a drouth, too much rain, boll worms and caterpillars. Now it thinks the crop will be seriously affected. We have had much rain, during the past week, and the cane crop has been greatly improved by it. Cotton planters, however, want no rain, still we hear less about worms than we did a month ago. The damage by them will be less than was anticipated.—[New Iberia Sugar Bowl. The worm has come and the cotton has gone. From all we can learn at least one-third of the crop has been destroyed, and in all probability more. Some few planters report that they have not been injured seriously, but the majority say that the crop has been eaten up.—[Catahoula News. We learn from good authority that on many plantations in the Oak Ridge country the caterpillars have completely stripped the cotton, leaving not a single leaf. Their ravages were confined at the outset to the young cotton, after eating which they turned their attention to the older growth. Notwithstanding all this though, the planters in that section say they will get a production of one bale per acre.—[Morehouse Clarion. Mr. F. H. G. Taylor has just returned from a trip to the lower part of the parish, through which he has been traveling for several days in his capacity of tax collector. He reports that on most plantations the middle crop of bolls has almost entirely dropped or "shed" off, and the worms are playing sad havoc with the top crop. This, with the flood of rain we are having, will compel us to reduce our estimates of the crop in East Carroll fully one-third.—[Carroll Conservative. It is estimated that the heavy rain of Monday destroyed at least a third of the open cotton crop in this parish. This heavy loss, together with the losses by worms and rust, will have the effect to cut the cotton crop very short. Many who were some time ago calculating on a full average crop now think themselves fortunate if they gather a half crop.—[Baton Rouge Advocate. A meeting of the farmers in and around the place of Mr. B. Willis, in Warren county, was had last week to consider the cotton picking question. The meeting was composed entirely of colored people and small planters of the neighborhood, and among the resolutions adopted was one which placed the picking price at one cent per 100 lbs or 60 cents when the pickers furnish their own rations. All the planters in that section have joined in the matter, and declare that if any member deviates from this course, that he will thereafter be cut by the rest of the organization. Would it not be well for other sections to pursue the same course. Paris green seems to be growing in favor as a caterpillar exterminator. On the plantations of Mr. Dennis Smith, Mrs. Newton Butler and Mr. Snelling, wherever this poison has been used properly, it worked like a charm and saved the cotton. Mr. Snelling has two hundred acres in cotton and will make almost a full crop. On Mr. Dennis Smith's place arsenic and concentrated lye were experimentally applied to a small patch, which was completely destroyed by the preparation, and did no further damage to the worms than to deprive them temporarily of food.—[Rapides Gazette. Picking has commenced in most all places. The worms have been playing havoc with the cotton crop. Most of the plantations on Little and Black rivers, and over in Concordia, have been considerably damaged. The planters have used several kinds of poison, and the general opinion seems to be that the Texas worm destroyer is a failure. The Paris Green is considered much better. Dr. Calhoun and Mr. David Ker, of the Hills, tell us they have used arsenic, and that has killed them effectually. Some think this was the last crop, but if another crop is to come, which ever is the best destroyer, our planters should be ready with that particular poison.—[Catahoula News. We are sorry to learn that what is said to be the second hatching of caterpillars have made their appearance in large numbers in different portions of the parish and have commenced eating the cotton plants. The crop is a little backward, but otherwise very promising. To what extent the worm will increase and ravage the cotton, it is impossible at this time to estimate. Some of our farmers are using poison, but among many there is a prejudice against it. A continuance of dry weather would be of great advantage now.—[Lafayette Advertiser. The prospect of a cotton crop up to the 1st of August, in the hill section of Natchitoches, was never better, but alas! the worm came and made short work of the farmer's hope. There will not be an average of 400 pounds of seed cotton to the acre gathered in this section; that is, a quarter of a bale per acre. In the northern portions of Natchitoches and South Bienville, the drouth was so long and so severe, that the cotton was injured to the extent of full one-half, and fortunately the worms did not visit them and capture the remainder.
