

INSURANCE NEWS.

The National Insurance Convention is in session at St. Paul, Minn. The call was issued last month by the Massachusetts insurance commissioner in so quiet a way as to suggest that he didn't want either the public or the press to know anything about the affair. Evidently the official exponents of State supervision are beginning to take Mr. Foot's view of things, and find that their specialty is of "no consequence." [N.Y. Mail.]

The direction of the Bureau Veritas has just published the following statistics of maritime disasters reported during the month of July, 1877, concerning all flags: Sailing vessels reported lost—23 English, 10 Norwegian, 3 German, 8 American, 6 French, 4 Dutch, 3 Italian, 2 Spanish, 2 Russian, 1 Brazilian, 1 Greek, 1 Swedish, 77. In this number are included 8 vessels reported missing. Steamers reported lost—4 English, 1 German, 1 French, 1 Swedish; total, 9.—[Baltimore Underwriter.]

The Baltimore Gazette remarks "that the owner of the piano factory which was burned the other day being now pretty well down the newspapers are improving the opportunity to give him the kicks which they ought to have given him during his prosperity." Which all looks well on paper, but while approved by the building inspector, used without complaint by the workmen and insured without murmur on the part of the underwriters, what was there in the matter to attract the attention of the newspapers? The proprietor being down should be kept down until he learns to avoid putting up such man traps as the one lately destroyed.

Companies have been formed in France to guarantee employees against the pecuniary liabilities falling upon them in case of accident in their factories. The companies will insure individual workmen; but when an accident happens, they seek all the evidence and adduce all the arguments which tend to reduce the claim, and it generally ends in a compromise; while the employers are to the oppression of being parties to the oppression of a bereaved family. M. Ferron, a member of the Societe du Nord, says: "In matters of insurance against accidents, the only method which deserves recommendation is that by which the workman, as well as the master, is guaranteed against the effects of his imprudence or negligence. When an accident happens, the insurer indemnifies the employer, and the latter in his turn indemnifies the workman, without the intervention of the insurer in the latter arrangement. In this way only can assurance against accidents retain the regular and moral conditions of insurance in general." [London Review.]

The eighth annual meeting of the Underwriters' Association of the Northwest was opened on Wednesday last, in Chicago, by President Chas. E. Bliver, from whose address we make the following extracts:

To preach that indemnity shall be sold, not to the highest, but to the lowest bidder, or for what a customer may choose to pay, does not require a high order of talent. But to preach such a doctrine and save a company from bankruptcy would prove far beyond the skill of the ablest underwriter.

Insurance is a necessity—the protection it affords is invaluable, and like everything else worth having, it costs something. That cost is a reasonable profit, must be paid by the assured. Whenever a company or its agents sell insurance below an adequate rate for the risk assumed, it may be set down as a fact that they place the true measure of value upon the indemnity that will be furnished when a loss occurs.

He also insisted upon what the State owes to insurance; equal taxation and only such; the same legal right as other kinds of business; the "prevention of the organization of insolvent companies—or those without an adequate capital, invested in bonds issued by the United States, or by the State under whose law the company may be incorporated;" well considered building laws; that laws be enacted providing for a judicial inquiry into the origin of fires; more effectual laws for the punishment of incendiarism, and the abatement of the "tramp nuisance."
