

INSURANCE NEWS.

The total loss by the fire at St. Johns foots up \$12,000,000; of which over \$5,000,000 falls upon owners who neglected to insure.

Don't keep your lamps in a hot room during the day; the heat causes the oil to generate gas, and renders the danger of an explosion upon an attempt to light it.

When a lamp has been burning for several hours it becomes heated and gas is formed rapidly. Never turn a lamp down suddenly in such a case, for by so doing the consumption of the gas is stopped, and the lamp will ordinarily burst.

By the use of an alloy of antimony and bismuth a thermometer is made so sensitive as to mark the change of one thousandth of a degree. So sensitive is it that it fluctuates with the expiration and inspiration of an observer, and the lifting of the hand before it changes the recorded temperature.

There is in this city a salvage corps, supported by the Board of Underwriters, whose duty it is to attend all fires, and, where possible, to attack and subdue them while yet in an incipient stage, but whose more special calling is to save from destruction or damage all movable property, or, where there is not time for removal, to protect the same from water damage by covering it with tarpaulins, in all cases where the fire is of such magnitude as to defy their efforts.

One object of this reference to the subject is to call attention to the fact that as the said salvage corps is maintained and supported by the Board of Underwriters, the final payment for their services really comes from the pockets of the assured, for unquestionably the expense of that organization enters into the matter of determining the rates at which insurance can be sold, just as does any other item of expense.

The further object we have in view is to suggest that the Board of Underwriters be authorized to levy upon all property so saved a fair and equitable assessment, and to collect the same by legal measures if necessary, as contribution towards the support of the corps through whose efforts that property was saved from destruction.
