THE RIGHT TO COLLECT LICENSES.

Touching our article of Thursday on the limitation of the State debt, the inquiry has been addressed to us whether that limitation does not prohibit any taxation by the State of any other burden or contribution from the people in the form of license or otherwise.

Amendment No. 3 provides as follows: "The revenue of each year derived from taxation upon real, personal and mixed property or from licenses shall be devoted solely to the expenses of the said year for which it shall be raised, excepting any surplus remain, which shall be devoted to sinking the public debt."

Assuming, therefore, that the portion of the tax allotted to the general expenses of the State should prove adequate to that object, the revenue over and above that sum will be applicable to the sinking fund.

IS NOT THIS REVOLUTION?

The right of Louisiana to representation in the United States Senate is an indelible constitutional right. Yet the Republican members of the Senate are engaged in an effort to deny that representation.

Republican majority to admit Judge Spofford to his seat is a lawless, high-handed, revolutionary proceeding.

And while his partisans are carrying on this unconstitutional proceeding in the Senate the President does not hesitate to tell the Democratic House that he has called Congress in extra session for the purpose of asking an appropriation of \$32,000,000 to sustain the army which has not yet been six months relieved from the duty of holding in subjection the States of South Carolina and Louisiana.

The unconstitutional attitude of the Republican Senators, it is the duty of the President to use all his influence and authority to rebuke. Has he done so? The answer to this question is that his friends, his adherents, his representatives in the Senate are themselves among the conspirators, voting solidly to divest this State of one of its highest and most sacred constitutional rights.

If Louisiana was to-day be deprived of her representation in the Senate by a partisan and unscrupulous majority of that body, any other State may be outraged in a similar manner whenever the interests and purposes of that majority may prompt it.

Will the Democratic House then obey the demand made upon it? We trust not until the revolution begun ten years ago by the Republican party against the constitutional rights of the States is utterly crushed and abandoned, and the Senators of Louisiana and South Carolina are admitted to their seats on an equality with those of the States of Ohio and New York.
