

INSURANCE NEWS.

The Guaranty Fire Insurance Company of New York has re-insured its risks in the Royal of England.

The Galveston Fire Insurance Company has re-insured its business in the Union Fire and Marine Insurance Company of Galveston.

The New York Cotton Exchange proposes to insure the lives of its members, and is seeking to have its charter amended so as to accomplish this end. Are we to have a new and dangerous co-operative plan?

Lebanon, Penn., is harboring a fledgling who has just left the Home Mutual Life Insurance Company, and which proposes to defraud the people on the old threadbare "co-operative plan."

The inspection of buildings in Boston for the purpose of ascertaining the existing facilities for escape from fire, and of remedying defects, is progressing. This is an example which other cities would do well to follow.

We hear from time to time of the operations of the former employe of the Chicago swindle, the "Protection," which finally collapsed in August last. It seems that these well instructed individuals are endeavoring to place their heads over again, with some minor modifications, among various rural communities. They should all of them be given a wide berth.

Among the resolutions passed at the gathering of insurance commissioners in St. Paul, this month, was one to require a detailed statement of the salaries and commissions paid to officers of insurance companies. We do not know why these should be any sensitive matter among men having their annual income paraded in official reports every year, and yet most of us feel it, and if one asks us questions about our income we feel that he is impertinent, even if he knows that he simply asks so that he may rejoice in our prosperity or condole with us in our adversity. Probably the income tax, with its published reports, was productive of more lying than any other law ever placed upon the statute books. Such being the almost universal feeling of banking about what they feel to be their own private affairs, we are somewhat surprised at the want of delicacy betrayed by these officials in requiring detailed statements of their salaries, especially as such statements can serve no useful purpose whatever. The gross expenditures of companies are given now, and we can figure out our ratios from them, our losses, and make up our minds from the result whether the company is economically managed or not. The publication, in the reports, of such details of each officer's salary, does not have the effect to make the large salaried officials ask for a reduction, and would only breed discontent among those whose salaries are comparatively small, and cause, perhaps, a labor strike in many of our insurance offices. Then, too, it might make some insurance commissioners discontented with the frugal fare provided by the State, and set them intriguing for a chance to enjoy the wages of sin for a season. Such questions are not legitimately within the scope of the provisions of our insurance law, and therefore an officious impertinence which would justify any officer, if he felt safe in doing it, in kicking the questioner out of his office.

Warning to Life Companies.

The Insurance Department of New York has just issued a circular, requiring the life companies to fill up a blank with the name and policy office address of each and all their policy holders. Why he has done this we do not pretend to divine, but we exert every management to kindly refuse compliance with a demand so unreasonable, needless and perniciously inquisitorial. Recent experiences ought to have shown the superintendent, not to what vexatious and ruinous use such lists have been and always will be put by a class of men ever ready to prey on a life insurance company. How easy a thing it is, when access can be had by any blackmailer to a list of names with addresses of a company's policy holders, to write some sander on the company and extort money by threat to send it by mail to every one of the company's patrons. Two companies warring on one another would thus have weapons put in their hands for the mutual ruin. The demand is simply inhuman, and in any other business would be scouted with universal indignation. The department, by making it, lays itself open to the gravest suspicion, for the sake of this could be, and doubtless would be, made by some members, openly and clandestinely, a most fruitful source of trouble, and if you would Mr. Smyth himself, who is a man of business, like it, if the Internal Revenue Department were to insist upon his furnishing a list of all the customers of his business, with the address of each, so that it could be consulted and made use of by rival establishments or personal enemies, Mr. Smyth's business as a customer would be ruined, and he would be obliged to leave the course of his business, by care, skill and labor, and who on earth has any right to oblige him of the fruits of his good management and industry?

Life insurance companies are now suffering severely from many inevitable causes, besides the ill-genes and extortion brought upon them by dishonest and unskillful conduct of corporations now in the hands of receivers, and Mr. Smyth, whose province it should be to guard and protect the interests of his customers, ought to be the last man to expose them to so great a danger and wrong as a compliance with his demand would entail. Let us trust the no officer of an insurance company who has prospered at heart will be so reluctant to be trusted as to insert the required names and addresses in the blanks superintended by the Insurance Department, and forward them by mail.
