CONGRESSIONAL PROCEEDINGS.

The Senate.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25.—The Senate met at 12 m., the Vice President in the chair, and prayer was offered.

The Chair laid before the Senate a communication from the Secretary of War transmitting in answer to a resolution, the report of the Chief of Engineers as to the cost of removing the obstructions from the harbor of Pensacola, Fla., referred to the Committee on Commerce.

By Mr. Conkling: A petition for the repeal of the banking law. Referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

By Mr. White: A memorial for the relief of Anna Ella Corral, for compensation for services during the war. Referred to the Committee on Finance.

By Mr. Sherman: A bill to provide for the construction of a ship channel from Mobile to the Gulf. Referred to the Committee on Commerce.

By Mr. Walker: A bill to provide for the publication of the debates of the Constitution in French. Referred to the Committee on Printing.

By Mr. Chaffee: A resolution that the Secretary of the Treasury be authorized to issue bonds for the purpose of raising money to pay the interest on the public debt.
