

NOTES.

McClellan's majority is now put down at 13,281. The Alabama penitentiary is said to have earned \$35,000 above expenses in September. The municipal council of Paris have been petitioned to name a street after the late M. Thiers. The Supreme Court of the United States has now about one thousand cases on the calendar. The Mississippi penitentiary now has 953 convicts. Number within walls 169, showing 793 working outside on plantations. The Elmira Gazette concedes that 75 per cent of the greenback vote in Chemung county came from the Democratic party. Two German steamers have reached St. Louis by sea this year, and a sailing vessel has made the passage from the mouth of the Jenissei to Norway, laden with Siberian products. Prof. Lewis Swift, of Rochester, says that six comets have been discovered this year, and that two faint ones are now visible with the telescope, one in the evening, the other in the morning sky. They are at work now on the Straits of Dover tunnel. The tunnel will belong to its proprietors for thirty years; then the two governments will be able to take possession of it on certain conditions. Under the heading "Another Grand Duke" the London Times announces that the Russian army in Bulgaria has been reinforced by the sixth son of the Emperor, the Grand Duke Paul Alexandrovich. It is stated that the municipal authorities of Leipzig, Germany, have proclaimed a line of ten marks on any woman who wears trailing dresses on the streets of that city. The proclamation also orders the police to arrest such offenders, and their names are to be published in the local papers. An agent of the Russian government is endeavoring to make a contract in Philadelphia for an iron bridge across the Delaware, to be 2100 feet long, to have a single span, and to cost about \$3,000,000. As the time for its construction is limited to the opening of the spring campaign no contract has been made. Christian missionaries have made their mark in Japan to such an extent that some of the Buddhists of that country are preparing young men to go out as preachers to counteract the teachings of the missionaries. A number of these young men have been sent to China and to India for thorough instruction in the mysteries of Buddhism. President Hayes doesn't find Washington life so expensive as some of his predecessors have. He is reported as saying that during the first six months of his term he has spent only \$4000 of the \$25,000 which he has drawn, and that he looks for a reduction in Congress to reduce the Executive's yearly salary from \$50,000 to the old figure of \$25,000. The famine in the northeast of Brazil continues to press severely on the energies of the government and the charity of the nation. About \$700,000 have already been spent, and it is calculated that about \$1,000,000 more are now utterly dependent on charity. Disease, as usual, is showing itself, and at the capital and port of Ceara yellow fever is rather bad. The lakes and canals are carrying the bulk of Western produce this year, and if a small reduction in tolls makes such a change from rail to water-path in the coast may it not be fairly presumed that the difference of seven to ten cents per bushel in favor of the Mississippi route over all other routes eastward will win for the Mississippi the bulk of this carrying trade. President Hayes has written the following letter to Gov. Rice, of Massachusetts: "It is a great satisfaction to be able to congratulate you on the gratifying result in Massachusetts. I am glad if, on general reasons, on your account and on my own. Your personal popularity had no doubt much to do with it. It is an example of what the Republicans can do when they unite, in spite of the blunders of President."

A San Francisco Bull Fight.

After declining several rushes of the monster, the Mexican was seemingly pinned against the eyes, he managed to get away. The bull was then lashed and thrown down, and the Mexican got on the animal's neck, facing the tail, and got around the ring in triumph, resisting all efforts to dislodge him. A drunken butcher then chambered over the fence, seized the bull by the horns, and attempted to gouge out one of his eyes. The bull belted and tossed the meat-slayer into the air, only to catch him again and give him another lift. A cur was then sent into the arena, much to the edification of the audience, who laughed and shouted while the bull charged and attempted to adversary into a corner, and it turned him against the fence. The doork-keeper was finally arrested on a charge of cruelty to the dog, and the Sunday report came to an end.
