SUPERIOR CRIMINAL COURT.

State vs. Thom. Walker, charged with grand larceny, stealing wearing apparel on November 6, 1877, from Mrs. Ellen Collins. The jury returned a verdict of guilty of petty larceny.

In the case of the State vs. Simon St. Geme, found guilty of manslaughter, a motion for a stay of execution was granted.

Last evening the time of the court was occupied in trying George Welsh, colored, for bearing arms and being armed, in entering and stealing from the residence of Mr. J. Newman wearing apparel, etc.

When the Grand Jury was called, Judge Whitaker informed them that the commission appointed by him, composed of Drs. Joe Jones, John Holt and A. Cavendish, to inquire into the sanity of Isaac Chandler, confined in the City Insane Asylum, had reported.

The report reads: "In the judgment of the commission the said Isaac Chandler is of unsound mind, while sane on many subjects, he is insane on many others and at times manifests temporary fits of ill-temper and violence."

United States vs. Joseph Hampton et al.—An order was entered in this case suspending the Marshal to turn over to the government all logs seized in Vernon and Calcasieu parishes since the advertisement of the sale of logs seized in Calcasieu under article 297, Code of Practice. There are about 200 of these logs in Calcasieu, and about 1000 in Vernon.

SEVENTH DISTRICT COURT. In this court the argument on the Mexican bond cases occupied the morning. They went over to the afternoon.

The bond of Samuel Gammage, one of the defendants in the cotton cases, was forfeited.
