We regret to notice the death of Mr. A. G. Tompkins, on the 20th of November, in Minden, Webster parish.

The Clinton Patriot-Democrat, one of our most valued Louisiana exchanges and a straight Democratic journal, has entered, under auspicious circumstances, upon its seventh volume.

The President's message occupies eight and a half columns of the N. O. DEMOCRAT.

Our Clinton contemporary is mistaken. It was the old Pz that printed the message in full.

The Boston Bulletin has taken up the subject of the adulteration of food, and makes a most terrible showing therein.

The adulteration of coffee with chicory, the dealers in that article in turn cheat the grocers by adulterating coffee with chicory.

Tea is more difficult to adulterate. In London, however, there are eight establishments where the grounds of tea-making, the old exhausted tea leaves are bought up from the hotels and coffee-houses.

There is scarcely any need of going over the whole list of adulterated articles of food. Even flour itself, is adulterated and mixed with potato starch, bean flour, chalk, bone dust and even plaster of Paris.

It appears that Germany finds considerable trouble in getting rid of her immense silver hoard. Germany some years ago demonetized silver and prepared for the withdrawal of all the silver coinage of the empire from circulation at once.

The temperance movement has invaded even the national Capitol. There has been, of late, say the papers of both parties, a good deal of alcoholic eloquence on the floor of the Senate and the House.

The message of the Governor of Virginia to the Legislature of that State is mainly devoted to financial questions; indeed, his remarks on these subjects comprise more than nine-tenths of the whole document.

The House wrangled nearly a whole day last week on the question, which committee should have jurisdiction over the improvement of the Mississippi river, and finally came to what seems a very extraordinary decision.

The Governor does not like the funding bill, which has been the source of so much discord, but as it is a contract he insists that it shall not be violated, and declares that any attempt to nullify it would be rank repudiation.

The Montgomery Advertiser records the sudden death, from paralysis of the brain, in that city, of Col. Robert Tyler, in the sixtieth year of his age.

At the breaking out of the war between the States he held a very lucrative office in Philadelphia, but on the withdrawal of his native State—Virginia—from the Union he promptly resigned and made a narrow escape from an infuriated Union mob which surrounded both his office and his residence.

Subsequently the deceased gentleman was chairman of the Democratic State Central Committee of Alabama, in which position he displayed great energy and political sagacity.

For several years he was editor of the Montgomery Advertiser, which journal, shrouded in mourning for his death, pays his memory a feeling but just tribute.

From an old friend and resident of Pointe Coupee, we have received the following very interesting account of a cypress canoe, found in that parish, twenty-two feet below the surface of the bank.

The last rise of the Mississippi river having caused the bank to cave in front of Mr. James Vigne's plantation, a little above Waterloo, a cypress canoe was discovered imbedded in the bank, at a depth of about 22 feet.

It was dug out with every precaution, and, although broken, the pieces were saved and put together again. The boat is carved out of a cypress log, and the wood itself is pretty well preserved.

It is more than probable that this boat has been imbedded in the sand since or before that time; or, it might have belonged to the little fleet of DeSoto, or conveyed LaSalle down the Father of the Waters.

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considered, it will probably be found that they owe less relatively than the citizens of any other Southern State. Their rate of taxation is correspondingly lower.

Gov. Kemper suggests, therefore, that there be no increase in the rate of taxation; and that the State reduce its debt as much as possible, by selling out its remaining interests in internal properties.

As to repudiation, he says: "No State has ever broken its faith except at the cost of banishing capital, prostrating enterprise, impoverishing its people and drying up the sources of its revenue."
