At the close of yesterday's proceedings of the Potter committee, Mr. Morrison filed for future consideration of the committee, a proposed reply to the letter of Secretary Sherman, referred to him by the chairman, as follows:

I am directed by the committee on investigation, etc., to acknowledge the receipt of your letter, in which you ask to have subpossed from Leuisiana 100 witnesses, who, as appears from your letter, you expect to give material testimony touching the freedom of election and intimidation of voters in all of East Feliciana and parts of West Feliciana partses in that State; and in respect of which election you regard yourself accused, in the resolution under which this committee is acting, of inducing certain election officers

to falsify the returns.

With your request to have these witnesses
subpensed, you furnish a statement of the
matter about which they are expected to testify, with reference to "records of Congress,"
where their former testimony, touching the
same matter, is to be found. These records

These records of Congress, you inform the committee, authorize you to state that the combined result of the testimony of said witnesses will be, that in said parishes 150 persons have been at some time threatened, driven from home, burned out, wounded or shot at, whipped, killed, hung, or expelled from office, and that there was in said parishes and adjoining parishes, before and at the time of said election, such a system of intimidation that the large Republican majorities which appeared at previous elections were thereby converted into large Democratic majorities. In reply, I am directed to say that the records of Congress, to which you refer, and other records of Congress, with which you are doubtless familiar, authorize the statement that the former testimony of said witnesses has been contradicted by witnesses as numerous, as intelligent, and whose testimony is at least as well entitled to belief.

It is needless to add that should these 100 witnesses again repeat their former testimony, 500 other witnesses, as least as credible as they, will be ready again to contradict them. Seven committees of Congress, have investigated this question of in-

as they, will be ready again to contradict them. Seven committees, or sub-committees of Congress, have investigated this question of infimidation in Louisiana, and have heard the testimony of tweaty times one hundred witnesses; but no committee has ever agreed as to the fact of the existence or non-existence of of such intimidation. You and your political associates of the "Visiting Committee" witnessed certain proceedings of the "Returning Board," which were based on alleged intimidation, and by which proceedings said Returning Board reversed the decision of the Deople made by their ballots actually cast, and then you, with all your associates, made haste to bear witness to the justice of its conclusions.

The gentiemen (most of them, until recently, your political associates), with whom you refused to join in an effort to secure a fair count of the votes, but who were permitted to witness, presumably, all of the proceedings of the Returning Board witnessed by you, were as prompt to declare its proceedings partial and unfair, and its conclusions entitled to no respect whatever. In view of this disagreement and uncertainty as to the actual fact, this committee will not feel itself justified in condemning or accusing any election officer who has in good faith, under the laws of Louisiana, done any act based on intimidation by such officer believed to exist, even though the committee may believe such act did wrongfully and unlawfully annul and reverse the legally expressed will of the people of that State and of all the States. In view of such refusal to Join in the exercise of any influence over the officers of Louisiana, even to secure a fair count of the votes legally cast, and of your alleged reasons therefor, it is to this committee a matter of regret that the repetition of the former testimony of these witnesses, or any inquiry as to the intimidation of voters or other frequiry invoving the wrongful act of others, is deemed by you necessary to vindicate you from the accusation of having interfered with or exercised any influence or control over the officers of that State, for which by your own statements you "should be condemned by the people of every State in the Union.

Whatever of accusation is made against you in the resolutions of the House of Representatives, under which this committee is acting, rests, so far as any testimony yet heard shows, upon the statement and allegation that to it, fluence and control D. A. Weber and James E. Anderson in their official acts, you made them verbal promises and worse learning such letter their testimony is preserved and now acc ble to all, in the "records of Congress."
