SHORT BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCHES FROM NOTES GATHERED.

Col. J. W. Patton, Mayor.

As a soldier, gentleman, citizen and Democrat in fact, in every position in life, his character is without stain or reproach.

He is descended from the illustrious Gen. Hugh Mercer, who fell at the battle of Princeton after serving with great distinction with Gen. Washington.

A native of Virginia, educated for the army, a graduate of West Point, Colonel of the Twenty-second Louisiana, he was distinguished for his coolness and bravery during the war.

He has been conspicuous in sacrificing his time and comfort in the efforts of our people to secure the redemption of our State from Radical rule, and in 1865, when almost the unanimous choice of the Democratic convention for Mayor, he found it conducive to harmony in the party, and he promptly withdrew, and the nomination, together with that of Accounts and Finance, was accorded to the merchants.

A. H. ISAACSON, ADMINISTRATOR OF FINANCE, aged 45 years, born in 1833 in Philadelphia, his parents then being residents of Louisiana.

He was a merchant in Covington and New Orleans. He has been in command of his State when he was with Chittenden & Demaree, of New Orleans. Afterwards he was with Speake & McCraw, of New Orleans, and Richardson & Co., of Jackson, La.

He is at present the superintendent of streets of the Second and Third Districts, which position he has held since 1872. He is a member of the Board of Health, and is also a member of the Board of Public Works.

Major Behan's commercial experience commencing with the firm of H. B. Behan & Co. Upon the breaking out of the war he promptly enlisted, and after two years' creditable service, was promoted to the rank of Major in the 10th Louisiana, where he served with distinction.

Behan, as an active member of the Chamber of Commerce, submitted to the Hydrographic Commission a plan of the harbor of New Orleans, as a port of call for the commerce of the Gulf, and contributed largely toward securing the appropriation of \$50,000 for that purpose.

From 12 m. to 6 p. m. yesterday, 21 deaths, 8 new and 13 old cases were recorded at the Board of Health. UNION FRANCAISE. An Appeal from Terre-aux-Bouais-The Fever in St. John. This association is still nobly responding to the calls of the sick and destitute French residents of Terre-aux-Bouais and of the parish. The relief committee has sent physicians, nurses, money and supplies to every part of the State where an appeal from their countrymen has reached them. Mr. Achille Lafond, a member of the relief committee, just returned from St. John the Baptist, says that the fever is spreading in that parish, and has caused the greatest excitement and fear among the inhabitants. He says that Father Lavigne, the Catholic priest, has done an indefatigable and zealous work in the cause of charity. He has been to St. James yesterday evening to inquire into the state of health in the parish, and to see whether any French residents are in need of help. The officers of all the parishes of the Terre-aux-Bouais and of the parish of St. John the Baptist, and other parishes, have extended all facilities to the association, and offer to convey to the sick and destitute the supplies, provisions or freight for the relief of the sufferers. The following communication was read and approved: HOWARD ASSOCIATION OF TERRE-AUX-BOUAI. At a meeting of the committee of the Howard Association of Terre-aux-Bouais, held on the 19th inst., the following resolutions were unanimously adopted, to-wit: Whereas, Mr. B. Mauries has received instructions from the Union Francaise to take up new cases, but to prepare to return to New Orleans for the purpose of attending and nursing the French sick, which the committee of the relief committee in the parish of St. John the Baptist; and Whereas, Mr. Mauries is the only help, assistance and comfort to the sick and destitute of this community, and his absence would certainly endanger the condition of those unfortunate, who look upon him as their saviour, and provide for them; therefore, the committee of the relief committee of the Terre-aux-Bouais, do hereby respectfully appeal to the generally and charitably disposed of the Union Francaise and all other parishes, to make such arrangements as they may deem proper to send forthwith a copy of these resolutions to the Union Francaise. AN APPEAL. The St. Alphonsus Orphan Asylum to the Charitable Public.
