THE CITY ATTORNEY GIVES HIS OPINION CONCERNING THE TENURE OF OFFICE OF THE CITY COUNCIL.

The following communication was received by the Mayor yesterday morning. As the document, which is a very important one, was telegraphed in an evening publication we take the occasion to say that this is a correct copy of Mr. Jones' opinion.

OFFICE CITY ATTORNEY, New Orleans, November 13, 1878.

To the Honorable Mayor and Administrators: In answer to your resolution asking me for my opinion as to the time at which the city officers-elect may claim and take their seats in accordance with law, etc., I am of opinion that there is no real conflict between the provisions of act No. 7 of 1878 (the city charter) and the new election law (act No. 58 of the extra session of 1877).

The former prescribes the qualifications of the Mayor and Administrators, and regulates the manner of holding elections and declaring the result thereof. Section 5 of the city charter provides: "That on the second

MONDAY FOLLOWING THE DAY

of their appointment or election, the Council shall hold its first meeting in the City Hall, at which the Mayor and Administrators of the departments elect, having presented and filed their certificates of election and qualifications as herein provided, shall enter upon the discharge of their duties."

These officers were candidates at the general election held on the fifth day of November, 1878, and the day of their election (within the meaning of the election law) will be the day on which they shall be declared to be elected, by the officer appointed to fulfill that duty, under the law regulating elections and the return of the same.

The civil sheriff of this parish and the sheriff of every other parish in the State is, by section 36 of the election law, the returning officer, and by section 37 of the same he is made the officer to certify the returns, to make public proclamation of the result, and to make due returns thereof to the Secretary of State.

He is not authorized to declare any one elected, and is not to do so.

(See sheriff's return in DEMOCRAT of November 12.)

Section 33 of the election law provides "that it shall be the duty of the Secretary of State, in his department, to receive the returns, and to make public proclamation of the result, and to make due returns thereof to the Secretary of State."

In my opinion, this is the first and only official declaration of a candidate as elected under the present law. It is the result of the election, and what has always been accepted as, and is understood to be, the official result of the election.

I think, therefore, that on the first Monday after such declaration is published, the Mayor and Administrators elect are entitled to take office.

I think they require no credentials except their bonds and oaths of office, made in accordance with the charter. I do not think city officers require to be commissioned by the Governor, and, in my opinion, the provisions of the charter in relation to the commissions of these officers where commissions are necessary.

Although the statement is made without authority, close observation justifies the assertion that the opinion is accepted by the present incumbents, and that whenever the newly elected officials shall present themselves for the occupation of their respective departments, after the "promulgation" of the result of the election by the Secretary of State, they will find the present Mayor and Administrators ready to most graciously give up their trust in the contract of the city to the new officials.

It is nevertheless thought at the City Hall that the opinion of the City Attorney, without being contradictory in itself, has an appearance of contradiction in the fact that the city charter and his own opinion regarding the period when the officers elect are entitled to take office, are brought into comparison. For they say, the City Attorney, after quoting the charter, which reads "that on the second Monday following the day of their appointment or election the Council shall hold its first meeting at the City Hall," etc., and arguing that, technically, the election takes place on the day of the declaration of the Secretary of State that the candidates receiving the highest votes have been elected, he nevertheless says that he thinks that the Mayor and Administrators elect are entitled to take office on the first Monday after such declaration is published.

Since the matter had provoked a feeling akin to mystification, our reporter sought Mr. Jones and, having found him, asked him if there was a contradiction in the fact in his opinion. Mr. Jones answered that neither existed. The opinion had been gotten hastily, it was true, but with sufficient care to cover the main requirements of the resolution of the Council. In regard to the apparent contradiction, he said that had he explained it in his communication he would have said that the main point, being the date of the declaration of the Secretary of State, being a period at least equal to the "second Monday following the day of their appointment or election," according to the wording of the city charter.

THE ELECTRIC LIGHT.

LOCAL VIEWS ON THE SUBJECT OF EDISON'S LATEST INVENTION.

The subject of the electric light, which has produced such a stir, both in America and Europe, amongst the holders of gas stock, has not diminished in interest, and as day after day news comes of Edison's progress in his experimentation the feeling augments. The electric light is by no means a recent invention, it having been operated successfully by Sir Humphrey Davy. The principle of the light is perfectly simple. The two poles of a strong battery or electro-galvanic machine are connected, the one with a piece of carbon above, and the other with a like carbon pencil below, their points barely touching.

When the electric current passes from the battery or electro-magnetic machine, at the points of the carbon pencils there is given out a brilliant white light. The trouble heretofore in the practical adaptation of this light has been that these carbon points in a short time burned away and the circuit was broken.

Various inventions have been made to obviate this, but as yet no regular movement of the carbons that as they burn they were slowly away they would approach one another slowly, thus keeping up the current of electricity.

ONE OF THE CHIEF OBSTACLES which has prevented the electric light from coming into general use was that it was found impossible to subdivide the intense light so that it would be endurable to the eye in our ordinary apartments. Its brilliancy and fulgurance as shown by the repeated experiments in the open air, were too great for a dwelling, and the question then came, how can this be reduced and so subdivided that the same quantity of light may be given to different numbers of carbons.

Up to this time Edison has failed to accomplish it, except Edison's invention toward which THE WORLD IS LOOKING proves successful. Speaking on this subject, "Last December I experimented on the same line that I have struck now. I got together all the books that I could find, and read up on it, and thought I was lost. From what I read I got the idea that they were to be made impracticable. Two and a half William Wallace invited me to Assonia. Well, he's a great brass inventor, and has a laboratory nearly perfect. He has all the different electrical things he can get his hands on, and he's making them. Prof. Barker and Prof. Dyer were with me. I saw for the first time everything in practical operation. It was all before me. I saw the thing had not come to the point that had been made. I saw that it had not been subdivided so that it could be brought into private houses. In all electric lights heretofore obtained the intensity of the light was great, and the quantity very low. I came back home, and made continuous experiments two nights in succession. I discovered the necessary secret, so simple that a bookblack might understand it. It is to be done by the speaking phonograph. It was real, and no phantom. I was as sure that it would work as I was that the phonograph would work. I got my first machine. It was a success. Since then I have had a dozen machines, each different, and the last one improvements upon those first made. The subdivision of the light is all right. The only thing to be determined is its economy. I am already positive that it will be cheaper than gas, but have not yet determined how much cheaper. To determine its economy, I am now putting up a brick building, 125 feet long. I have already ordered two-hundred-horse-power engines for this building."

In opposition to Mr. Edison's claims there have come out many savants, but as EDISON'S GENIUS has so far outstripped all science, it may be the highest honor that can befall a solution. One learned professor writing on this subject says: "The principal difficulty to be overcome is the lack of economy in any method of producing light by electricity. It is necessary to determine whether the well-known fact that electricity gives the light a great strength will yield about ten times as much light when used to produce the voltaic arc between carbon points as it could by being passed through a piece of platinum, so as to raise it to Dewall's point, and give the light. In some experiments recently made in Paris by M. Fontaine it was found that a powerful battery of forty-eight elements could produce in one lamp a light by incandescence of platinum wire, equal to that of the same current when used in two lamps the light in each was only three to five lumens, and when divided between three lamps the result was not much better. It is to be seen that the subdivision of the light is a matter of great difficulty. A similar result was reached whether the lamps were placed in series in the same circuit or in derived circuits. In the latter case the machine in place of a battery is the source of the electricity, and the same difficulty would present itself, with this additional one, that whereas the electro-motive force of a battery remains constant under all changes of current, that of a machine does not, but decreases as the resistance increases."

In view of the interest taken in the subject by a representative of the Democrat called to mind Mr. Fontaine's remark that the New Orleans Gaslight Company, to learn the views. Mr. Forstall was seen at the office of the company and responded willingly to all questions asked.

He said he had just returned from a visit to the Paris Exposition, to which place he went to investigate the subject of the electric light. He examined thoroughly into the one-horse power engine, the kind of engine or engine that furnished the light, and the grounds there were a number of these lights, but steam power to the above standard was not used. Edison's dynamo-electric machines which furnished the light, and the engines which required the attendance of an engineer, and in this there is a loss of economy.

ON ONE OF THE BOULEVARDS there were several of these lights in operation. The boulevard was only 300 feet wide, and the lights were placed in the middle of the boulevard, and in no case were there more than two hundred feet. He thought it was a serious obstacle in the adaptation of the light that it was found so difficult to get suitable conductors of the electricity to transmit it any distance with sufficient volume to give the necessary quantity for illumination.

When questioned upon the point as to whether the inventor of the electric light, if successful, would or would not affect the gas companies, he said he thought it would not. In the first place, if the streets were lighted with them the company would not want to convert their steam to run the dynamo-electric machines to furnish the electricity to the new lights.
