MR. ZAMAONA TO MR. FOSTER.

Minister Zamaona has recently addressed the Baltimore Board of Trade in reply to the letter of Minister Foster discouraging trade with Mexico. While observing in all respects the stately courtesy due from the Mexican Minister at Washington to the representative of the United States at the City of Mexico, Mr. Zamaona nevertheless managed to say that Mr. Foster had slandered Mexico and her commerce, and that, too, with a strong intimation of interested malice.

To this end Mr. Zamaona has induced a delegation of merchants and manufacturers from St. Louis, Chicago, and other cities of the United States, to visit the principal cities of Mexico. Great preparations have been made to receive them at the Mexican capital and the government, which most heartily sympathizes in his efforts to establish closer relations with this country, is looking forward most anxiously to the arrival of the visitors, to whom every facility for the fullest and most exhaustive investigation will be afforded.

It is only by such personal observation that the truth can be discovered. If it be true, as Mr. Foster asserts, that Mexico is a country yet in a state of semi-barbarism, that neither persons nor property are protected and secured, that the Mexican market is nothing but a decoy trap for foreign merchants and manufacturers, the members of this delegation will certainly discover these facts and make them known.

Mr. Zamaona calls attention to the proofs of the sincerity of the aspiration on the part of Mexico to establish intimate and mutually advantageous relations of commerce with this country. To this end Mexico entered into two treaties with the United States, in 1849 and again in 1868, far more liberal than any that she has contracted with any other government.

The convention now in session in this city will use all its influence to secure the active assistance of our government in this project, and Mr. Zamaona assures us that Mexico will liberally respond to all our overtures.

A number of large sugar importers and refiners of New York consulted Hon. David A. Wells last year on the subject of the assessment and collection of the duties on sugar. Mr. Wells has just given his views on the sugar question in quite a lengthy pamphlet. The position taken by him is directly against the interests of the government, against the planters of Louisiana and in favor of the New York refiners.

however, that Congress, with the facts before it, lately developed in the sugar refining business, showing the wholesale frauds in the undervaluation of sugar imported, and the dangerous and poisonous adulteration practiced by the refiners, will make any change in the tariff simply to sustain the languishing business of the New York sugar refiners.
